An Act to Prohibit Discrimination against Osteopathic Physicians and Provide Patient Choice.

Approved for introduction by a majority of the Legislative Council pursuant to Joint Rule 203.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

#### Sec. 1. 32 MRSA §2587 is enacted to read:

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#### §2587. Discrimination against osteopathic physicians prohibited

 Discrimination prohibited. When medical training and specialty board certification are considerations in the credentialing of osteopathic physicians, a state board,
commission or department; hospital, health care facility, medical staff, professional service corporation or professional limited
liability corporation; health maintenance organization, preferred provider organization, independent practice association, managed
care organization, health plan or any other insurance provider may not discriminate, on the basis of education or training, against eligible osteopathic physicians who have:

- A. Graduated from medical school and post-doctoral programs approved by either the American Osteopathic Association or the Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education; or
- B. Been awarded board eligibility or board certification by either the American Osteopathic Association or the American
  Board of Medical Specialties.
- 26 2. Violations. Any violation of this section may be enjoined in an action brought either in the name of the people of the State by the district attorney for the county in which the violation occurs, upon receipt of a complaint by the aggrieved 30 physician, or directly by the aggrieved physician.
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### **SUMMARY**

In order to increase access to and choice of physicians, this bill requires hospitals, health maintenance organizations, insurance companies and all health care entities that require a physician to be residency trained, board certified or eligible for certification in a medical specialty to accept residency training or certification approved by the American Osteopathic Association, the Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Specialties or the American Board of Medical Specialties as satisfaction of the requirement.
