	SUMMARY

	Current law specifies that most members of the Maine State
24	Retirement System qualify for retirement benefits after 25 years
	of creditable service. State police officers and Maine State
26	Prison employees who were employed as such prior to September 1,
	1984 qualify for retirement benefits after 20 years of creditable
28	service and upon reaching 50 years of age. State police officers
	and Maine State Prison employees who began service on or after
30	September 1, 1984 are subject to the general threshold of 25
	years of creditable service.

	This bill restores the lower threshold of 20 years of
34	creditable service and 50 years of age to state police officers
	and certain Maine correctional facilities employees and applies

that lower threshold to inland fisheries and wildlife officers

and marine resources officers.
