#### Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows: 2 Sec. 1. 29-A MRSA §2054, sub-§1, ¶B, as enacted by PL 1993, c. 683, Pt. A, §2 and affected by Pt. B, §5, is amended to read: 4 6 "Authorized emergency vehicle" means any one of the following vehicles: 8 (1) An ambulance; 10 (2) A Baxter State Park Authority vehicle operated by a Baxter State Park ranger; 12 A Bureau of Marine Patrol vehicle operated by a 14 coastal warden; 16 (4) A Department of Conservation vehicle operated by a forest ranger; 18 20 A Department of Conservation vehicle used for forest fire control; 22 A Department of Corrections vehicle used 24 responding to the escape of or performing high-security transfer of a prisoner, juvenile client 26 or juvenile detainee; 28 A Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife vehicle operated by a warden; 30 (8) A Department of Public Safety vehicle operated by a liquor enforcement officer for the purpose of 32 enforcing section 2411 or Title 28-A, a state fire inspector or a Maine Drug Enforcement Agency officer; 34 36 (9) An emergency medical service vehicle; 38 (10) A fire department vehicle; 40 (11) A hazardous material response vehicle; (12) A railroad police vehicle; 42 (13) A sheriff's department vehicle; 44

28	(1) Emergency lights used on an ambulance, an
	emergency medical service vehicle, a fire department

(3) Members of an emergency medical service licensed by Maine Emergency Medical Services may display and use on a vehicle a flashing red signal light of the same proportion, in the same location and under the same conditions as those permitted municipal and volunteer firefighters, when authorized by the chief official of the emergency medical service.

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### SUMMARY

This bill allows a public utility emergency service vehicle to use a siren and red light. It also subjects a public utility emergency service vehicle to the same laws regarding right-of-way as other authorized emergency vehicles.
