13. Forest practices seminars. The Department of Conservation shall hold 14 seminars per year, one at each of the 7 campuses of the Maine Technical College System and 7 at geographically diverse locations throughout the State as determined by the Commissioner of Conservation, to educate landowners, harvesters and the general public regarding forest practices.'

Further amend the bill by relettering or renumbering any nonconsecutive Part letter or section number to read consecutively.

Further amend the bill by inserting at the end before the summary the following:

FISCAL NOTE

The Department of Conservation will incur some minor additional costs to administer several regulatory requirements pertaining to clear-cutting and to hold, on a yearly basis, 14 seminars dealing with forest practices in different locations across the State. These costs can be absorbed within the department's existing budgeted resources.'

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SUMMARY

	This amendment provides that for a landowner who owns more
4	than 500 acres, an individual clear-cut may not exceed 75 acres
	in total area. It also provides that timber harvesting is exempt
6	from this restriction on clear-cut size upon issuance of a
	natural disturbance exemption by the Commissioner of
8	Conservation, as necessary to allow the salvage or presalvage of
	timber for which there is a high probability of substantial loss
10	or damage from severe natural disturbances, which, include, but
	are not limited to, fire, insect infestation, disease, ice and
12	wind. It requires the Department of Conservation to hold 14
	seminars per year, one at each of the 7 campuses of the Maine
14	Technical College System and 7 at geographically diverse
	locations throughout the State as determined by the Commissioner
16	of Conservation, to educate landowners, harvesters and the
	general public regarding forest practices.
