22	Amend the order by striking out everything from the first indented paragraph to the end and inserting in its place the following:
26	'ORDERED, the Senate concurring, that the Commission on Child Abuse is established as follows.

30	1. Commission established. The Commission on Child Abuse, referred to in this order as the "commission," is established to study the prevention of and responses to child abuse.
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34	2. Membership. The commission consists of the following 5 members, each of whom must possess a strong interest or expertise in the problem of child abuse.

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	6. Compensation. Members of the commission are entitled to
22	receive the legislative per diem as defined in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 3, section 2 and reimbursement for travel and
24	other necessary expenses for attendance at meetings of the commission.

	7. Report. The commission shall submit a report along with
28	any recommended legislation to the 120th Legislature no later than November 1, 2000. If the commission requires an extension
30	of time to make its report, it may apply to the Legislative Council, which may grant the extension.
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	8. Commission budget. The chairs of the commission, with
34	assistance from the commission staff, shall administer the commission budget. Within 10 days after its first meeting, the
36	commission shall present a work plan and proposed budget to the
	Legislative Council for its approval. The commission may not
38	incur expenses that would result in the commission's exceeding its approved budget. Upon request from the commission, the

Executive Director of the Legislative Council or the executive director's designee shall provide the commission chairs and staff with a status report on the commission budget, expenditures incurred and paid and available funds.'

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8 SUMMARY

This amendment replaces the joint order. It creates the Commission on Child Abuse, consisting of 5 Legislators.

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The commission's charge is narrower than proposed in the original joint order. The commission shall examine the current policies and public and private programs and resources related to physical and sexual abuse of children. The commission may accept public testimony. The commission may identify means to coordinate the available programs and resources to prevent and respond to child abuse. The commission's report is due November 1, 2000.

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
