"Passenger" means a person who is traveling by train with lawful authority and who does not participate in the train's operation. "Passenger" does not include a stowaway. B. "Railroad" means a form of nonhighway ground transportation that runs on rails or electromagnetic guideways, including: (1) A commuter or other shorthaul railroad passenger service; and (2) A high-speed ground transportation system. "Railroad" does not include rapid transit operations that are not connected to the general railroad system. C. "Railroad carrier" means a person providing railroad transportation. D. "Railroad property" means all tangible property owned, leased or operated by a railroad carrier, including a right-of-way, track, bridge, yard, shop, station, tunnel, viaduct, trestle, depot, warehouse, terminal or any other structure, appurtenance or equipment owned, leased or used in the operation of a railroad carrier including a train, locomotive, engine, railroad carrier including a train, locomotive, engine, railroad carrier including or office, office equipment or intangible property such as computer software or other information. E. "Right-of-way" means the track or roadbed owned, leased or operated by a railroad carrier and that is located or either side of its tracks and that is readily recognizable to a reasonably identified as such by fencing or appropriate		Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

26	This bill creates the Railroad Trespass Prevention Act. The
	bill makes it illegal to trespass on railroad property without
28	the railroad's consent and imposes either a fine of not more than
	\$100 or imprisonment of not more than 30 days for trespassing.
30	The bill also makes it illegal to be a stowaway and imposes a
	fine of not more than \$1,000 or imprisonment of not more than 6
32	months for being a stowaway.
