COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "C" to H.P. 139, L.D. 201, Bill, "An Act to Repeal the Maine Criminal Justice Academy Certification Requirements for Sheriffs"

Amend the bill by striking out the title and substituting the following:

**'An Act to Amend the Maine Criminal Justice Academy Requirements for Candidates for Sheriff'**

Further amend the bill by striking out everything after the enacting clause and before the summary and inserting in its place the following:

**'Sec. 1. 30-A MRSA §371-B, sub-§3, ¶D, as repealed and replaced by PL 1997, c. 562, Pt. D, §6 and affected by §11, is amended to read:**

D. The candidate submits written certification from the Maine Criminal Justice Academy that the candidate has ~~acquired the minimum college credits in required courses, training hours and years of experience, or combination thereof, to qualify for an executive certificate under academy standards.~~

(1) Met the basic law enforcement training standards under Title 25, section 2804-C; or

(2) Met the basic corrections training standards under Title 25, section 2804-D and has 5 years of supervisory employment experience.'

**SUMMARY**

The amendment replaces and retitles the bill. The amendment repeals the requirement that a candidate for sheriff qualify for an executive certificate under the Maine Criminal Justice Academy standards and instead requires a candidate to meet only the Maine Criminal Justice Academy basic law enforcement training standards or meet the basic corrections training standards and have 5 years of supervisory employment experience.
