2	become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

6	Whereas, currently there is a moratorium on the issuance of new lobster and crab fishing licenses; and

10	crab fishing licenses may be issued to individuals who held a lobster and crab fishing license in the year immediately

Currently, there is a moratorium on the issuance of new Class I, Class II or Class III lobster and crab fishing licenses; the moratorium expires on December 31, 1999. Under the provisions of the moratorium, a person who did not hold a license in the previous year may not be issued a lobster and crab fishing license. This bill amends the moratorium to allow a Class I, Class II or Class III lobster and crab fishing license to be issued to a person who was licensed as such prior to 1996 and requires the Commissioner of Marine Resources to give priority to those applications.
