RESOLUTION, Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Maine to Require That Petition Signatures Be Based on 10% of Registered Voters.

Constitutional amendment. Resolved: Two thirds of each branch of the Legislature concurring, that the following amendment to the Constitution of Maine be proposed:

Constitution, Art. IV, Part Third, §18, sub-§2 is amended to read:

2. Referral to electors unless enacted by the Legislature without change; number of signatures necessary on direct 8 initiative petitions; dating signatures on petitions; competing measures. For any measure thus proposed by electors, the number 10 of signatures shall not be less than 10% of the tetal-vote-for Governor-east-in-the number of citizens registered to vote at the 12 time of the last gubernatorial election preceding the filing of such petition. The date each signature was made shall be written 14 next to the signature on the petition, and no signature older 16 than one year from the written date on the petition shall be valid. The measure thus proposed, unless enacted without change 18 by the Legislature at the session at which it is presented, shall be submitted to the electors together with any amended form, substitute, or recommendation of the Legislature, and in such 20 manner that the people can choose between the competing measures 22 or reject both. When there are competing bills and neither receives a majority of the votes given for or against both, the 24 one receiving the most votes shall at the next statewide election to be held not less than 60 days after the first vote thereon be submitted by itself if it receives more than 1/3 of the votes 26 given for and against both. If the measure initiated is enacted 28 by the Legislature without change, it shall not go to a referendum vote unless in pursuance of a demand made in 30 accordance with the preceding section. The Legislature may order a special election on any measure that is subject to a vote of the people. 32

36 Constitutional referendum procedure; form of question; effective date. Resolved: That the municipal officers of this State shall notify the inhabitants of their respective cities, towns and plantations to meet, in the manner prescribed by law for holding a statewide election, at a statewide election, on the Tuesday following the first Monday of November following the passage of this resolution, to vote upon the ratification of the amendment proposed in this resolution by voting upon the following question:

"Do you favor amending the Constitution of Maine to require 46 that the number of signatures needed for the direct initiative of legislation be equal to at least 10% of the 48 number of citizens registered to vote on the date of the last gubernatorial election preceding the filing of the initiative?"

The legal voters of each city, town and plantation shall 4 vote by ballot on this guestion and designate their choice by a cross or check mark placed within the corresponding square below 6 the word "Yes" or "No." The ballots must be received, sorted, R counted and declared in open ward, town and plantation meetings and returns made to the Secretary of State in the same manner as votes for members of the Legislature. The Governor shall review 10 the returns and, if it appears that a majority of the legal votes 12 are cast in favor of the amendment, the Governor shall proclaim that fact without delay and the amendment becomes part of the 14 Constitution on the date of the proclamation; and be it further

16 Secretary of State shall prepare ballots. Resolved: That the Secretary of State shall prepare and furnish to each city, town 18 and plantation all ballots, returns and copies of this resolution necessary to carry out the purpose of this referendum.

SUMMARY

24 This resolution proposes to amend the Constitution of Maine to require that the number of signatures on a direct initiative petition equals at least 10% of the number of citizens registered to vote on the date of the last gubernatorial election.
