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Sec. 6. Staff assistance. Resolved: That upon approval of the Legislative Council, the Office of Policy and Legal Analysis shall provide necessary staffing services to the commission; and be it further

Sec. 7. Compensation. Resolved: That legislative members are entitled to receive the legislative per diem and reimbursement of necessary expenses for their attendance at authorized meetings of the commission. Public members not otherwise compensated by their employers or other entities whom they represent are entitled to receive reimbursement of necessary expenses and a per diem equal to the legislative per diem for their attendance at authorized meetings of the commission; and be it further

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Sec. 8. Report. Resolved: That the commission shall submit a report with any necessary implementing legislation to the Joint Standing Committee on Criminal Justice by January 15, 2000. Following receipt of the report, the Joint Standing Committee on Criminal Justice may introduce legislation to the Second Regular Session of the 119th Legislature. If the commission requires a limited extension of time to conclude its study and make its report, it may apply to the Legislative Council, which may grant the extension; and be it further

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Sec. 9. Commission budget. Resolved: That the chairs of the commission, with assistance from the commission staff, shall administer the commission budget. Within 10 days after its first meeting, the commission shall present a work plan and proposed budget to the Legislative Council for approval. The commission may not incur expenses that would result in the commission exceeding its approved budget. Upon request from the commission, the Executive Director of the Legislative Council or the Executive Director's designee shall promptly provide the

legislative sessions can be absorbed by the Legislature utilizing existing budgeted resources. If an extension of the reporting deadline is granted and the commission requires staffing assistance during the legislative session, the Legislature may require an additional General Fund appropriation to contract for staff services.

The Department of Corrections and the Department of Education will incur some minor additional costs to participate as members of the commission. These costs can be absorbed within the departments' existing budgeted resources.'

The commission shall collect and analyze information regarding the educational levels and needs of offenders in the State's correctional facilities, review research on effective correctional educational practices; evaluate the current and potential use of technology in delivering educational programs and identify resources necessary to carry out any recommendations. In doing its work, the commission may consult with other state departments, persons representing associations concerned with learning disabilities and family literacy, law enforcement agencies and persons providing probation services. The commission must report its recommendations to the Joint Standing Committee on Criminal Justice by January 15, 2000.

The amendment also adds an appropriation section and a fiscal note.

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
