An Act to Increase Sanctions for Passing School Buses that Have Red Lights Flashing.

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- Sec. 1. 29-A MRSA §2308, sub-§6, as enacted by PL 1993, c. 683, Pt. A, §2 and affected by Pt. B, §5, is amended to read:
- 6. Penalty. A violation of this section is a Class E crime which that, notwithstanding Title 17-A, section 1301, is punishable by a \$250 minimum fine and a mandatory 30-day suspension of the operator's driver's license for the first offense and a mandatory 30-day suspension of the operatory suspension of the first offense is punishable by a 90-day suspension of the operator's driver's license.

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A person who commits a first offense of this section may serve in lieu of the license suspension 80 hours of community service for the school district for which the bus was operating. The school district shall determine the nature of the service and the person shall complete the service within one year of conviction.

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SUMMARY

- In the following ways this bill amends the penalties for illegally passing a school bus that is stopped and has its red lights flashing:
- 28 1. For a first offense, adds a mandatory 30-day license suspension;

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2. Allows a first-time offender the option of serving 80 hours of community service to the school district in lieu of the license suspension;

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- 3. Increases the mandatory license suspension from 30 to 90 days for a 2nd offense; and
- 38 4. Decreases the length of time from 3 years to 2 years after a first offense for which a 2nd offense will carry a mandatory 90-day license suspension.
