Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

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Sec. 1. PL 1995, c. 649, §11 is enacted to read:

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Sec. 11. Lesson plans: recommended textbooks. The Department of Education shall develop a set of detailed lesson plans for each grade, kindergarten to grade 12, covering mathematics; English: science and technology: social studies, including history, economics and civics; career preparation; visual and performing arts; health and physical education; and foreign languages. The lesson plans must be designed to satisfy the performance indicators and achieve the required level of proficiency in the listed subject areas under the system of learning results. The department shall also develop a recommended list of textbooks for each grade level and subject area. The department shall distribute the lesson plans and lists of textbooks to public school educators not later than January 1, 2001 for use during the 2001-2002 school year. The materials provided by the department under this section are to assist school administrative units and educators in implementing the system of learning results, but their use by school units and educators is optional. If the department fails to develop and provide the materials as provided in this section, this Act is repealed effective July 1, 2001.

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SUMMARY

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This bill directs the Department of Education to establish lesson plans and recommended textbook lists to assist schools in meeting the requirement of the learning results system. The plans and lists are to be made available for first use during the 2001-2002 school year. If the department fails to meet that deadline, the learning results system is repealed.
