	This bill requires landowners who own more than 100,000
36	acres of land in the State to harvest at or below a sustainable
	level on their forest land taxed under the Maine Tree Growth Tax
38	Law. It requires the Department of Conservation to adopt rules

to establish a procedure for determining landowner compliance.
