	This bill sets forth a definition of proper shelter in the
52	criminal cruelty to animals statute. The proposed language

tracks the language currently contained in the law governing civil violations. This language gives prosecutors a clear definition of proper shelter upon which to rely when deciding whether or not to bring criminal animal cruelty charges.
