Resolve, Creating a Commission to Study the Multicultural Education Needs of Maine Teachers to Ensure Multicultural Awareness and Understanding for All Maine Students.

Whereas, the State has both long-standing diverse cultural groups such as Native Americans, Franco-Americans, African 2 Americans and Latinos as well as significantly increasing numbers of immigrants from all over the world; and 4 Whereas. the multicultural communities of Maine are 6 expanding rapidly beyond the Portland area and resettlement of 8 immigrants is beginning to occur throughout the State; and Whereas, understanding and awareness of cultural differences 10 are crucial to a harmonious society with schools functioning as the primary vehicle of multicultural education; and 12 14 Whereas. education that is multicultural provides an environment that values cultural diversity and portrays it 16 positively; and 18 Whereas, educators have the responsibility under the statewide system of learning results to help students recognize and understand the diverse nature of society as responsible and 20 involved citizens; now, therefore, be it 22 Sec. 1. Commission established. Resolved: That the Commission to Assess the Multicultural Education Needs of Maine Teachers, 24 referred to in this resolve as the "commission," is established; and be it further 26 Sec. 2. Commission membership. Resolved: That the commission 28 consists of 11 members appointed by the Speaker of the House of 30 Representatives: 32 One member from the Joint Standing Committee 1. on Education and Cultural Affairs; 34 2. One representative of the Department of Education with specific expertise, knowledge, background and oversight of 36 Maine's multicultural communities or minorities and their needs; 38 3. One curriculum coordinator with specific experience in a 40 school or school district with high multicultural enrollment or one kindergarten to grade 12 teacher with experience and interest in multicultural education; 42 4. One representative from each of the following groups: 44 46 A. Maine Native American tribes; 48 B. Franco-Americans; 50 C. African Americans; or

- 2 D. Three representatives from African, Latino and Native-American Society, ALANA;
- 5. One representative of the University of Maine System
  with specific background in the preparation of teachers for
  kindergarten to grade 12;
- 6. One teacher of English as a 2nd language, ESL, with at 10 least 5 years experience in a Maine multicultural classroom;
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7. One member of the State Board of Education; and

- 14 8. One at-large member with demonstrated knowledge, experience and interest in multicultural education; and be it 16 further
  - Sec. 3. Chair. Resolved: That the chair must be elected by the full commission; and be it further
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Sec. 4. Appointments; convening commission. Resolved: That all appointments must be made no later than 30 days following the effective date of this resolve. The appointing authority shall notify the Executive Director of the Legislative Council upon making appointments. When the appointment of all members is complete, the appointing authority shall call and convene the first meeting of the commission no later than November 1, 1999; and be it further

30 Sec. 5. Duties. Resolved: That the commission shall study the problems Maine teachers face or will face in culturally diverse 32 schools and classrooms. The commission shall determine what needs to be done to prepare teachers to be effective both in 34 providing an appropriate educational program for multicultural classrooms and in helping all students to recognize and 36 understand the diverse nature of society. In conducting this study, the commission shall:

- Request the assistance of the Department of Education,
  the State Board of Education and ALANA and invite the participation of other experts and interested parties;
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Conduct a survey of Maine teachers to determine current 2. 44 completed multicultural education; of success in levels multicultural classrooms; problems encountered in multicultural classrooms; knowledge of effective strategies in multicultural 46 education; resources available to teachers in multicultural classrooms; skills needed for success in multicultural education; 48 and anecdotal evidence of needs and prior knowledge of dominant

- Maine minority cultures, including, but not limited to, Native Americans, Franco-Americans, African Americans, and Latinos; and
- 4 3. Evaluate the survey and analyze its findings; and be it further

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Sec. 6. Report. Resolved: That the commission shall submit a report and any necessary implementing legislation to the Joint Standing Committee on Education and Cultural Affairs by February 15, 2000. The Joint Standing Committee on Education and Cultural Affairs may submit legislation in the Second Regular Session of the 119th Legislature to implement the recommendations of the commission.

SUMMARY

18 This resolve creates a special commission to study the multicultural needs of Maine teachers to ensure that 20 multicultural awareness and understanding is brought to the attention of all students.
