10	This subchapter may be known as the "Runaway and Homeless
12	Youth Act of 1999."
14	§4096. Definitions
16	As used in this subchapter, unless the context otherwise
	indicates, the following terms have the following meanings.
18	1. Emergency shelter. "Emergency shelter" means a program
20	certified by the department as providing short-term residential
-	care to runaway and homeless youth.

10	C. Permit a runaway or homeless youth who has not attained

	period not to exceed 30 days without permission from the
14	youth's parent or other legal guardian. The period of
	residence in an emergency shelter may be extended for an
16	additional 30 days for such a youth with the written
	permission of the youth's parent or other legal guardian;

20	years to reside at an emergency shelter for a period not to

26	emergency shelter of a runaway or homeless youth who has not attained the age of 18 years within 24 hours of the

12	The Interagency Task Force on Homelessness and Housing Opportunities, established in Title 30-A, chapter 202, subchapter V, and the department shall:

16	1. Report. Report on the situation of runaway and homeless youth including:
18	A. A description of the runaway and homeless youth population and services needed;
20	
22	B. A list of all public and private resources available to runaway and homeless youth related to the services needed;
24	C. A description of gaps in services needed by runaway and homeless youth and recommendations for developing these
26	services;
28	D. Criteria and procedures for the care of runaway and homeless youth using the least restrictive alternatives; and

32	E. Criteria and procedures for the coordination of services to runaway and homeless youth among law enforcement, mental health and human services agencies.

36	2. Education review. Annually review the success of state and federal laws in securing the right of runaway and homeless youth to an education.

40	3. Plan. Develop a plan for the handling of and provision of services to runaway and homeless youth throughout the State.
42	The plan must focus on providing services through the department contracting for these services. The plan must be evaluated
	annually for effectiveness and revised if necessary.
44	§4099. Rules

4.0	The department shall adopt rules necessary to carry out the
48	provisions of this subchapter. Rules adopted pursuant to this section are major substantive rules as defined in Title 5,
50	chapter 375, subchapter II-A.

4	This bill establishes the Department of Human Services as
	the agency responsible for studying, planning for and creating
6	services for runaway and homeless youth. The services will seek
	to address needs of youth who are without families, who may be
8	exploited, who suffer greater health, mental health and
	educational problems than the general population and who have
10	less access to appropriate services. The bill seeks to develop a
	system of coordinated services for runaway and homeless youth
12	through street outreach, emergency shelters and transitional
	living programs. The bill involves the Interagency Task Force on
14	Homelessness and Housing Opportunities in these efforts.
