can be absorbed within the office's existing budgeted resources. The assessment of registration fees on the machine locations will increase dedicated revenue to the Office of Consumer Credit Regulation by \$5,000 annually beginning in fiscal year 1999-00.

This bill may increase prosecutions for Class E crimes. If a jail sentence is imposed, the additional costs to the counties are estimated to be \$82.48 per day per prisoner. These costs are not reimbursed by the State. The number of prosecutions that may result in a jail sentence and the resulting costs to the county jail system are expected to be insignificant.

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In addition to the potential increase in criminal cases, this bill also may increase the number of civil cases filed in the court system. The additional workload and administrative costs associated with the minimal number of new cases filed in the court system can be absorbed within the budgeted resources of the Judicial Department. The collection of additional fines may increase General Fund revenue by minor amounts.

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The Department of the Attorney General will incur additional costs to enforce the provisions regulating cash-dispensing machines operated by entities other than financial institutions. The Department of the Attorney General assumes that the additional enforcement activities associated with the change will be minimal and the costs associated with these activities can be absorbed within the department's existing budgeted resources.'

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30 SUMMARY

This amendment clarifies that point-of-sale or debit card terminals are not regulated as cash-dispensing machines and corrects a clerical error.

The amendment also adds a fiscal note to the bill.
