Resolve, to Establish the Maine Forest Policy Round Table Study Commission.

Sec. 1. Maine Forest Policy Round Table Study Commission 2 established. Resolved: That the Maine Forest Policy Round Table Study Commission, referred to in this resolve as the "round table," is established; and be it further 4 6 Sec. 2. Round table membership. Resolved: That the round table consists of at least the following 15 members, appointed jointly by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the 8 House of Representatives, except as otherwise indicated: 10 1. One economist with forestry expertise; 12 2. One sociologist with expertise in rural issues; 14 One owner of more than 1,000 acres of forest land in the 3. 16 State; 18 One owner of less than 1,000 acres of forest land in the 4. State; 20 One registered professional forester; 5. 22 6. One logging contractor; 24 7. One logging employee who does nonmechanized harvesting; 26 8. One retired logger; 28 9. One owner of a sawmill in the State; 30 10. One paper industry representative; 32 One town manager from a township in the State whose 11. 34 land total exceeds 50% in tree growth; 36 12. One representative of an environmental group working on forestry issues; 38 13. One representative of a recreational-based group; 40 14. One representative of the Department of Conservation, appointed by the Commissioner of Conservation; and 42 44 15. One member of the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over agriculture, conservation 46 and forestry matters. 48 The Legislature may appoint not more than 6 additional members, as it considers necessary. The Executive Director of the Legislative Council must be notified by all appointing authorities once the selections have been made and shall convene б the first meeting no later than 60 days following the effective The President of the Senate and the 8 date of this resolve. Sec. 5. Staff assistance. Resolved: That the round table may request staffing assistance from the Executive Director of the Legislative Council; and be it further

Sec. 6. Compensation. Resolved: That members are entitled to compensation for transportation costs and other compensation if their participation would entail economic hardship; and be it further

 Sec. 7. Report. Resolved: That the round table shall submit its report, together with any necessary implementing legislation,
to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over agriculture, conservation and forestry matters
in the Second Regular Session of the 120th Legislature no later than January 1, 2002.

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## **SUMMARY**

This resolve establishes the Maine Forest Policy Round Table
Study Commission to address and study key forestry issues,
including economic and labor issues, and to make recommendations
for changes in the State's forestry policy.
