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42	§312. Public Resources and Information for Maine Foundation established
44	The Public Resources and Information for Maine Foundation is
46	established to provide the State's citizens with increased access to unbiased information about state government procedures,
48	deliberations and public policy events to promote civic education, to stimulate the public dialogue and to provide the
50	resources for fostering greater citizen participation in State Government. The Public Resources and Information for Maine

2	Foundation shall foster, assist and participate in efforts to achieve its mission, including, but not limited to, the following
4	<u>efforts.</u>
4	1. Establishing public and private partnerships. The
б	Public Resources and Information for Maine Foundation, referred to in this chapter as the "foundation," shall endeavor to:
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10	A. Establish public and private partnerships that will provide resources for fostering greater citizen involvement in State Government;
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14	B. Increase citizen knowledge and understanding of State Government, including its processes, deliberations, procedures and responsibilities; and
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18	<u>C. Promote civic education and engender public dialogue on issues important to the citizens of the State;</u>
20	2. Citizen access and public outreach opportunities. The foundation may:
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24	A. Develop and propose new public information strategies for State Government in an effort to enhance citizen awareness and involvement in State Government;
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28	B. Develop and propose new entities and services for enhancing citizen access to State Government. These entities and services may include, but are not limited to:
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32	(1) Establishment of a speakers' bureau;

46	§313. Corporators
48	The Board of Corporators, who shall elect members of the board of directors as provided in section 314, consists of
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individuals and organizations classified as private sector corporators, public sector corporators and ex officio corporators.

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1. Private sector corporators. Private sector corporators are those individuals, partnerships, firms, corporations or other organizations providing support annually to the foundation at a level determined by the board of directors of the foundation.

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 2. Public sector corporators. Public sector corporators
 are those agencies of government and other organizations providing support annually to the foundation at a level
 determined by the board of directors of the foundation. For the purposes of this chapter, public sector corporators include State
 Government and its agencies, the University of Maine System, school administrative units, private colleges and postsecondary
 schools, the Maine Technical College System and such other public or guasi-public entities as may be approved by the board of directors of the foundation.

 3. Ex officio corporators. Ex officio corporators consist of the heads of the major state departments and agencies and the directors of the Margaret Chase Smith Center for Public Policy and the Muskie School of Public Services. State department and agency heads or their designees include but are not limited to the:

- A. Secretary of State;
- B. Treasurer of State;
- C. Director of the State Planning Office;
- D. Commissioner of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources; 34
- E. Commissioner of Professional and Financial Regulation;
- F. Commissioner of Conservation; 38
- <u>G. Commissioner of Education;</u> 40
- H. Commissioner of Environmental Protection; 42
- I. Commissioner of Administrative and Financial Services; 44
- J. Commissioner of Human Services; 46
- K. Commissioner of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife; 48
- L. Commissioner of Marine Resources;
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-	M. Commissioner of Labor;
2	N. Commissioner of Mental Health, Mental Retardation and
4	Substance Abuse Services;
6	O. Commissioner of Transportation;
8	P. Chief Executive Officer of the Finance Authority of Maine; and
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12	Q. Executive Director of the Maine State Housing Authority.
	4. Voting rights: chair. Each corporator has a vote in
14	such affairs of the foundation as may involve the corporators, as long as, in the case when the corporator is an organization, the
16	governing body of that organization shall designate an individual
	who is to exercise the voting right. The Secretary of State or a
18	<u>designee of the Secretary of State shall serve as chair of the Board of Corporators.</u>
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	<u>§314. Board of directors; officers</u>
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	The Board of Directors of the Public Resources and
24	Information for Maine Foundation, referred to in this chapter as the "board of directors," consists of 15 directors. The Board of
26	Corporators shall elect 11 directors from among the corporators,
	providing that 7 directors are elected from among the private
28	sector corporators and 4 directors are elected from among the public sector corporators. The Secretary of State and the
30	directors of the Margaret Chase Smith Center for Public Policy
	and the Muskie School of Public Services are permanent members of
32	the board of directors. There are a chair, a vice chair and a
	treasurer elected by the corporators from the board of
34	directors. The president of the foundation is appointed by the
	directors so elected or appointed and becomes a director and
36	chief executive officer of the foundation. The president may not
	be appointed from among the directors.
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	§315. General powers
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	The foundation may:
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	1. Bylaws. Adopt bylaws for the governance of its affairs,
44	have the general powers accorded corporations under Title 13-A,
	section 202 and do all other things necessary or convenient to
46	carry out the purposes of the foundation, including establishing
	foundation membership and membership criteria;
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50	2. Suit. Sue or be sued in its own name;
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	3. Application for receipt of funds. Apply for and receive				
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2	funds from any private source or governmental entity, whether by				
	way of grant, donation or loan or by any other manner;				
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	4. Real and personal property. Purchase, receive, hold,				
6	lease or acquire by foreclosure, operate, manage, license and				
	sell, convey, transfer, grant or lease real or personal property,				
8	together with such rights and privileges as may be incident and				
	appurtenant to the real or personal property and the use of the				
10	real or personal property, including, but not limited to, any				
	real or personal property acquired by the foundation from time to				
12	time in the satisfaction of debts or enforcement of obligations;				
14	5. Expenditures and obligations regarding real or personal				
	property. Make all expenditures and incur any obligations				
16	reasonably required in the exercise of sound business principles				
	<u>to secure possession of, preserve, maintain, insure or improve</u>				
18	real or personal property or interests in real or personal				
	property acquired by the foundation;				
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	6. Securities. Acquire, subscribe for, own, hold, sell,				
22	assign, transfer, mortgage or pledge the stock, shares, bonds,				
	debentures, notes or other securities or evidences of interest in				
24	or indebtedness of any person, firm, corporation, joint stock				
	company, partnership, association or trust and, while the owner				
26	or holder thereof, exercise all the rights, powers and privileges				
	of ownership, including the right to vote thereon;				
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	7. Encumbrance on property. Mortgage, pledge or otherwise				
30	encumber any property right or thing of value acquired pursuant				
	to the powers contained in subsection 4, 5 or 6 as security for				
32	the payment of any part of the purchase price of the property				
	right or thing of value;

	8. Contracts and liabilities. Make contracts, including				
36	contracts for services, and incur liabilities for any of the				
	purposes authorized in this chapter;				
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	9. Debt. Borrow money for any of the purposes authorized				
40	in this chapter; incur debt, including the power to issue for				
	that debt its bonds, debentures, notes or other evidences of				
42	indebtedness, whether secured or unsecured; and secure the debt				
	by mortgage, pledge, deed or trust or other lien on its property,				
44	rights or privileges of every kind and nature, or any part of its				
	property, rights or privileges or interest in its property,

48	10. Cooperation with agencies and organizations. Cooperate				
	with and avail itself of the services of governmental agencies				
50	and the University of Maine System and cooperate and assist and				
	and confidence and allantin and confidence and applied and				

otherwise encourage organizations, local or regional, private or public, in the various communities of the State in the promotion, 2 assistance and development of civic education, public knowledge 4 and awareness of State Government and citizen access to public information. 6

- §316. Limitation of powers
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The foundation, notwithstanding the powers enumerated in 10 section 315, does not have the power or authority to enter into contracts, obligations or commitments of any kind on behalf of 12 the State or any of its agencies, nor does it have the power of eminent domain or any other power not provided to business 14 corporations generally. Bonds, notes and other evidences of indebtedness of the foundation may not, in any way, be a debt or 16 liability of the State or constitute a pledge of the faith and credit of the State.

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§317. Liability of officers, directors and employees

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All officers, directors, employees and other agents of the 22 foundation entrusted with the custody of the securities of or authorized to disburse the funds of the foundation must be bonded, either by blanket bond or by individual bonds, with a 24 surety bond or bonds with a minimum limitation of \$250,000 26 coverage for each person covered conditioned upon the faithful performance of that person's duties, the premiums for which must 28 be paid out of the assets of the foundation.

30 \$318. Prohibited interests of officers, directors and employees

32 Officers, directors and employees of the foundation and their spouses or dependent children may not receive any direct 34 personal benefit from the activities of the foundation in assisting any private entity. This section does not prohibit 36 corporations or other entities with which an officer or director is associated by reason of ownership or employment from 38 participating in public information and access activities with the foundation, as long as this ownership or employment is made 40 known to the board of directors and the officer or director abstains from voting on matters relating to the officer's or 42 director's participation. This prohibition extends to corporators who are not officers or directors of the foundation. 44

§319. Annual report; audit

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The foundation shall provide an annual report and an 48 independent audit of its activities to the Governor, the Legislature and its corporators and members. The foundation is subject to such further audit and review as required under the 2 State Government Evaluation Act.

4 §320. General conditions: dissolution

6 The foundation shall operate as a nonprofit organization consistent with its composition and broad public purposes. The 8 following conditions apply to the operation of the foundation.

 10 1. Net earnings of foundation. Net earnings of the foundation may not be expended for the benefit of any corporator,
 12 officer, director or employee except that the foundation may pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and otherwise hold,
 14 manage and dispose of property in furtherance of the purposes of the foundation.
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 Dissolution of foundation. Upon dissolution of the foundation, the corporators shall, after paying or making provision for the payment of all liabilities of the foundation,
 cause all of the remaining assets of the foundation to be transferred to the State.

Sec. 3. First meeting. The chair of the Board of Corporators
of the Public Resources and Information for Maine Foundation shall convene the first meeting of the Board of Corporators for
the purposes of nominating and electing the Board of Directors of the Public Resources and Information for Maine Foundation and
establishing Board of Corporators bylaws. The first meeting must be held within 60 days of the effective date of this Act. The
first meeting of the board of Corporators within 120 days of the
effective date of this Act.
