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### STATE OF MAINE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES 119TH LEGISLATURE FIRST REGULAR SESSION

HOUSE AMENDMENT "H" to S.P. 748, L.D. 2107, Bill, "An Act
to Authorize a General Fund Bond Issue in the Amount of \$20,500,000 to Construct Water Pollution Control Facilities and
Make Other Environmental Improvements"

20 Amend the bill by striking out the title and substituting the following:

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'An Act to Authorize a General Fund Bond Issue in the Amount of
 \$17,000,000 to Construct Water Pollution Control Facilities and
 Make Other Environmental Improvements'

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Further amend the bill by striking out everything after the 28 enacting clause and before the summary and inserting in its place the following:

'Sec. 1. Authorization of bonds to provide funds to construct water 32 pollution control facilities and make other environmental improvements. The Treasurer of State is authorized, under the direction of the Governor, to issue bonds in the name and on behalf of the State 34 in an amount not exceeding \$17,000,000 to raise funds to 36 construct water pollution control facilities; to close and clean up municipal solid waste landfills; to clean up tire stockpiles; to abate, clean up and mitigate threats to the public health and 38 environment from uncontrolled hazardous substance sites or other 40 hazardous waste discharges; to control polluted runoff; and to make drinking water system improvements as authorized by section 42 The bonds are a pledge of the full faith and credit of the 6. The bonds may not run for a period longer than 10 years State. from the date of the original issue of the bonds. 44 At the discretion of the Treasurer of State, with the approval of the 46 Governor, any issuance of bonds may contain a call feature.

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Sec. 2. Records of bonds issued to be kept by the Treasurer of State. 2 The Treasurer of State shall keep an account of each bond showing the number of the bond, the name of the successful bidder to whom 4 sold, the amount received for the bond, the date of sale and the date when payable. 6

Sale; how negotiated; proceeds appropriated. 8 Sec. 3. The Treasurer of State may negotiate the sale of the bonds by 10 direction of the Governor, but no bond may be loaned, pledged or hypothecated on behalf of the State. The proceeds of the sale of the bonds, which must be held by the Treasurer of State and paid 12 by the Treasurer of State upon warrants drawn by the State 14 Controller, are appropriated solely for the purposes set forth in this Act. Any unencumbered balances remaining at the completion of the project in section 6 lapse to the debt service account 16 established for the retirement of these bonds.

Sec. 4. Interest and debt retirement. The Treasurer of State 20 shall pay interest due or accruing on any bonds issued under this Act and all sums coming due for payment of bonds at maturity.

Sec. 5. Disbursement of bond proceeds. The proceeds of the bonds must be expended as set out in section 6 under the 24 direction and supervision of the Department of Environmental Protection, the Department of Human Services and the Department 26 of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources.

Sec. 6. Allocations from General Fund bond issue; environmental 30 improvements. The proceeds of the sale of bonds must be expended as designated in the following schedule.

Sec. 7. Contingent upon ratification of bond issue. Sections 1 to
 6 do not become effective unless the people of the State have
 ratified the issuance of bonds as set forth in this Act.

Sec. 8. Appropriation balances at year end. At the end of each fiscal year, all unencumbered appropriation balances representing
 state money carry forward. Bond proceeds that have not been expended within 10 years after the date of the sale of the bonds
 lapse to General Fund debt service.

36 Sec. 9. Bonds authorized but not issued. Any bonds authorized but not issued, or for which bond anticipation notes are not 38 issued within 5 years of ratification of this Act, are deauthorized and may not be issued; except that the Legislature 40 may, within 2 years after the expiration of that 5-year period, extend the period for issuing any remaining unissued bonds or 42 bond anticipation notes for an additional amount of time not to exceed 5 years.

Sec. 10. Referendum for ratification; submission at statewide
 election; form of question; effective date. This Act must be submitted to the legal voters of the State of Maine at a statewide election
 held on the Tuesday following the first Monday of November following passage of this Act. The municipal

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officers of this State shall notify the inhabitants of their respective cities, towns and plantations to meet, in the manner prescribed by law for holding a statewide election, to vote on the acceptance or rejection of this Act by voting on the following question:

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"Do you favor a \$17,000,000 bond issue for the following purposes:

10 (1) \$7,000,000 to construct water pollution control facilities, providing the state match for \$12,500,000 12 in federal funds;

- 14 (2) \$3,500,000 to protect the State's drinking water resources by granting funds to cities and towns for the closure and cleanup of their solid waste landfills;
- 18 (3) \$2,500,000 to protect the public health and safety and the environment by providing funds for the cleanup of tire stockpiles;
- (4) \$1,500,000 to abate, clean up and mitigate threats to the public health and environment from uncontrolled hazardous substance sites or other hazardous waste discharges;
- (5) \$1,500,000 to construct drinking water system
   improvements that address public health threats, providing the state match for \$7,500,000 in federal
   funds; and
- 32 (6) \$1,000,000 to construct new or to retrofit
   existing agricultural pollution control structures to
   34 protect the environment?"

The legal voters of each city, town and plantation shall 36 vote by ballot on this question and designate their choice by a cross or check mark placed within a corresponding square below 38 the word "Yes" or "No." The ballots must be received, sorted, counted and declared in open ward, town and plantation meetings 40 and returns made to the Secretary of State in the same manner as 42 votes for members of the Legislature. The Governor shall review the returns and, if a majority of the legal votes are cast in 44 favor of this Act, the Governor shall proclaim the result without delay, and this Act becomes effective 30 days after the date of the proclamation. 46

The Secretary of State shall prepare and furnish to each city, town and plantation all ballots, returns and copies of this
 Act necessary to carry out the purpose of this referendum.'

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2 Further amend the bill by inserting at the end before the summary the following: 4 **'FISCAL NOTE** 6 8 The estimated cost of sending this bond issue out to referendum will vary according to the total number of referenda 10 enacted during the 119th First Regular Session to be submitted in November 1999. The estimated cost to the Secretary of State if one to 6 referenda are enacted is \$95,000. 12 Each additional referendum costs an additional \$7,000. 14 If approved by the voters, the total cost of this bond issue 16 estimated to be \$20,927,000 with principal payments of is \$17,000,000 and interest payments of approximately \$3,927,000.' 18 20 SUMMARY 22 This amendment lowers the principal amount of the original bond issue proposal from \$20,500,000 to \$17,000,000. 24 It would fund the following issues: 26 \$7,000,000 to 1. construct water pollution control 28 facilities, providing the state match for \$12,500,000 in federal funds; 30 \$3,500,000 to protect the State's drinking water 2. 32 resources by granting funds to cities and towns for the closure and cleanup of their solid waste landfills; 34 \$2,500,000 to protect the public health and safety and 3. 36 the environment by providing funds for the cleanup of tire stockpiles; 38 4. \$1,500,000 to abate, clean up and mitigate threats to 40 the public health and environment from uncontrolled hazardous substance sites or other hazardous waste discharges; 42 5. \$1,500,000 to construct drinking water system 44 improvements that address public health threats, providing the state match for \$7,500,000 in federal funds; and 46 6. \$1,000,000 to construct new or to retrofit existing 48 agricultural pollution control structures to protect the environment. 50

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This amendment also adds a fiscal note to the bill. 4
