Sec. 1. Study of potential Maine runaway and homeless youth system 2 established. Resolved: That the study of a potential Maine runaway and homeless youth system is established. The study must examine, for runaway and homeless youth, community-based options, 4 low-barrier access, assessment, treatment, family mediation and outreach services that are consistent statewide to determine what 6 minimal level of service is required to ensure the safety and well-being of unaccompanied homeless youths. 8 10 1. The study must be conducted by a 10-member task force appointed as follows: 12 A. One Senator, appointed by the President of the Senate; 14 Two members of the House of Representatives, appointed в. by the Speaker of the House; 16 18 One member of the Interagency Task Force on Homelessness C. and Housing Opportunities, appointed by the Governor; 20 One member of the public who has an interest in issues D. involving runaway and homeless youths, appointed by the 22 Governor; 24 Ε. The Commissioner of Corrections or the commissioner's designee; 26 28 F. Sec. 2. Department of Corrections, Department of Education, 2 Department of Human Services, Department of Labor and Department of Mental Health, Mental Retardation and Substance Abuse Services to 4 develop additional services and plans to serve youths who have outgrown 6 the system. Resolved: That the Department of Corrections, Department of Education, Department of Human Services, Department 8 of Labor and Department of Mental Health, Mental Retardation and Substance Abuse Services shall develop additional services and 10 plans to serve youths who have outgrown the system. These services and plans, referred to in this section as "services and plans," must assist youths who are up to 21 years of age and who 12 are leaving the care of a department to undertake job training and to pursue education and housing programs. 14 Each department shall conduct a review of the department's delivery of services to youths who are up to 21 years of age and develop proposed 16 recommendations for services and plans in the following manner: 18 1. The Department of Corrections shall focus on community 20 placement in a therapeutic environment; 22 2. The Department of Education shall focus on nontraditional educational opportunities that promote attaining a 24 high school diploma; 26 з. of Human Services shall focus The Department on providing caseworkers and increasing access to basic services and 28 opportunities; 30 4. Department shall work The of Labor focus on opportunities and vocational training and experience; and 32 5. The Department of Mental Health, Mental Retardation and 34 Substance Abuse Services shall focus on expanding caseworker and clinical support for issues that include substance abuse. 36 Each department shall also consider whether to create an 38 adolescent division to administer all of the services that the department provides to youths who are up to 21 years of age. Legislature on or before March 1, 2000 on the progress each department has made in reviewing and developing services and

 Legislature on or before June 1, 2001 on the final results of
 each department's effort to create services and plans.

6 Sec. 3. Study of impact of legislative changes over last 8 years to General Assistance established. Resolved: That a study of the impact 8 of legislative changes over the last 8 years to General Assistance, referred to in this section as the "study," is 10 established. The study must assess program effectiveness, administrative practices at the local and state level, cost of 12 delivering General Assistance, client benefits and the effect on homelessness.

- The study must be conducted by a 9-member task force
 appointed as follows:
- 18 A. One Senator, appointed by the President of the Senate;

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- 20 B. One representative of a homeless shelter, appointed by the President of the Senate;
 - C. Two members of the House of Representatives, appointed by the Speaker of the House;
- 26 D. One representative of the Maine Homeless Coalition, appointed by the Governor;
- E. Two members of the public recommended by the Maine 30 Municipal Association, appointed by the Governor;
- 32 F. The Commissioner of Human Services or the commissioner's designee; and
- G. The Commissioner of Mental Health, Mental Retardation and Substance Abuse Services or the commissioner's designee.

36	This resolve implements 4 recommendations of the Interagency Task Force on Homelessness and Housing Opportunities, issued pursuant to Public Law 1997, chapter 643, Part XX, section 5.
38	The following are the 4 recommendations implemented by this resolve.
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42	1. This resolve establishes a study of a potential Maine runaway and homeless youth system. The study must examine, for runaway and homeless youth, community-based options, low-barrier
44	access, assessment, treatment, family mediation and outreach services that are consistent statewide to determine what minimal
46	level of service is required to ensure the safety and well-being
48	of unaccompanied homeless youths. This resolve establishes a 10-member task force to conduct the study and submit a report of
50	its findings, together with any recommended implementing legislation to the Legislature by March 1, 2000. The resolve
52	appropriates \$20,000 through the Maine State Housing Authority to pay for the study.

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2 The resolve appropriates \$100,000 each for 2. the Corrections, Department of Department of Human Services, Department of Mental Health, Mental Retardation and Substance 4 Abuse Services, Department of Labor and Department of Education 6 to develop additional services and plans to serve youths who have outgrown the system. These services and plans must assist youths who are up to 21 years of age and who are leaving the care of a 8 department to undertake job training and to pursue education and 10 housing programs.

The resolve establishes a study of the impact of 12 3. legislative changes over the last 8 years to General Assistance. The study must assess program effectiveness, administrative 14 practices at the local and state level, cost of delivering 16 General Assistance, client benefits and the effect on This resolve establishes a 9-member task force to homelessness. 18 conduct the study and submit a report of its findings, together with any recommended implementing legislation to the Legislature 20 by March 1, 2000. The resolve appropriates \$5,000 through the Department of Human Services to pay for the study.

4. The resolve increases the funding for the Temporary
Housing Assistance Program by \$250,000, from \$250,000 to \$500,000. The amount increased is dedicated to serve homeless
families or homeless youths staying in shelters in securing housing by providing security deposits and rental assistance.
The Community Action Agencies shall administer the dedicated funds.

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The total amount of the appropriations contained in this 32 resolve equals \$1,025,000.
