	1. Office established. The Office of Women's Health,
12	referred to in this chapter as the "office," is established
14	effective July 1, 2001. The office exists within the hierarchy
74	of the Bureau of Health, but includes staff and resources of the Department of Mental Health, Mental Retardation and Substance
16	Abuse Services.
18	2. Office purpose and goals; strategies. The purpose of
	the office is to expand the State's public health concerns and
20	focus to include a comprehensive outlook on the overall health
	status of women. The primary goals of the office are the
22	prevention of disease and improvement in the quality of life for
24	<u>women over their entire lifespan.</u>
64	The department and the Department of Mental Health, Mental
26	Retardation and Substance Abuse Services shall develop jointly
	strategies for achieving these goals within the office that

	The report must include any proposed legislation necessary to
44	fully implement or enhance the effectiveness of the Office of
	Women's Health, including a proposal for staffing the office.
