	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
2	Sec. 1. 22 MRSA §3174-X is enacted to read:
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6	<u>§3174-X. Pharmacy services; fees; rates of reimbursement</u>
	1. Fees charged to pharmacies on filing for reimbursement
8	for prescription services. The department may not impose any
10	processing fee or restructure its reimbursement rate for electronically submitted claims for pharmacy services.
12	2. Survey or audit required prior to any change in
14	dispensing fees. The department must perform an in-depth pharmacy service study prior to any change in the dispensing fee for pharmacy service claims. This study must determine the full
16	cost of filling a prescription and providing pharmacy services, including reasonable profits derived, in the Maine Medicaid
18	Program, the Cub Care program and the elderly low-cost drug
	program. The department must consider the results of this study
20	when determining pharmacy reimbursements.
22	SUMMARY
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	In 1995, as part of the Productivity Realization Task Force
26	recommendations, a 25¢ processing fee was imposed on all Medicaid pharmacy claims that were filed electronically. The federal
28	Health Care Financing Administration subsequently ruled that
	processing fees were not allowed and the enabling statute in
30	Maine was repealed as a result. The Department of Human Services, however, imposed the fee by changing the dispensing fee for
32	Medicaid reimbursement. This bill prohibits the imposition of a
	processing fee or the restructuring of the reimbursement rate for
34	electronically submitted claims. The bill also establishes a
36	requirement that the Department of Human Services conduct a current cost-of-dispensing survey prior to any subsequent revisions to the dispensing fee.
