Resolve, to Create a Commission to Study and Establish Moral Policies on Investments and Purchasing by the State.

Approved for introduction by a majority of the Legislative Council pursuant to Joint Rule 203.

Sec. 1. Commission to Study and Establish Moral Policies on Investments and Purchasing by the State established. Resolved: That the Commission to Study and Establish Moral Policies on Investments and Purchasing by the State, referred to in this resolve as the "commission," is established; and be it further

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- Sec. 2. Commission membership. Resolved: That the commission consists of 10 members as follows:
- 1. Two members from the Senate appointed by the President of the Senate:

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- 2. Two members from the House of Representatives appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives;
- 3. Two members from groups involved in social investments or human rights issues, one appointed by the President and one appointed by the Speaker;
- 20 4. One representative of the Maine State Retirement System appointed by the Speaker;

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5. One representative of the Department of Administrative and Financial Services, Bureau of General Services, Division of Purchases appointed by the Governor;

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6. One member of the public appointed by the Governor; and

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- 7. The Treasurer of State or the treasurer's designee; and be it further
- Sec. 3. Chair. Resolved: That the commission shall select a chair from among its members at its first meeting; and be it further
 - Sec. 4. Meetings. Resolved: That the commission shall meet at least 6 times; and be it further

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Sec. 5. Duties. Resolved: That the commission shall study the subject of and establish moral standards for investment and purchasing by the State. In examining the issue of a moral policy for investments and purchasing, the commission shall evaluate the policies in other states. In its report, the commission shall propose standards that require companies doing business with the State and companies invested in by the State to respect labor and environmental laws, provide health insurance and pension benefits, invest in their workers and pay their workers a wage that is sufficient to cover basic needs. The commission shall establish standards that prohibit the State from doing business with and investing in companies in other countries

that oppress or mistreat their workers. The commission shall consider factors for Maine businesses such as exploitation of workers, frequency of Occupational Safety and Health Administration violations and layoff of Maine employees solely for economic gain; and be it further

- Sec. 6. Staff assistance. Resolved: That, upon approval of the Legislative Council, the Office of Policy and Legal Analysis shall provide necessary staffing services to the commission; and be it further
- Sec. 7. Compensation. Resolved: That the members of the commission who are Legislators are entitled to the legislative per diem, as defined in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 3, section 2, and reimbursement for necessary expenses incurred for their attendance at authorized meetings of the commission. Other members of the commission who are not otherwise compensated by their employers or other entities that they represent are entitled to receive reimbursement of necessary expenses incurred for their attendance at authorized meetings; and be it further
 - Sec. 8. Report. Resolved: That the commission shall submit its report, together with any necessary implementing legislation, to the First Regular Session of the 120th Legislature no later than December 15, 2000. If the commission requires a limited extension of time to conclude its work, it may apply to the Legislative Council, which may grant the extension; and be it further
- Sec. 9. Budget. Resolved: That the chair of the commission, with assistance from the commission staff, shall administer the commission's budget. Within 10 days after its first meeting, the commission shall present a work plan and proposed budget to the Legislative Council for approval. The commission may not incur expenses that would result in the commission exceeding its approved budget. Upon request from the commission, the Executive Director of the Legislative Council shall promptly provide the commission chair and staff with a status report on the commission's budget, expenditures incurred and paid and available funds.

SUMMARY

This resolve creates a commission to study the establishment of moral investment policies and moral purchasing policies by the State. The commission shall consider such factors as exploitation of workers, frequency of Occupational Safety and Health Administration violations and layoff of Maine employees solely for economic gain. The commission shall establish standards for moral policies and present them to the Legislature.
