4 The Department of Economic and Community Development will incur some minor additional costs to adopt rules. These costs 6 can be absorbed within the department's existing budgeted resources.

The University of Maine System and the Maine Technical 10 College System will incur some minor additional costs to serve on the Applied Technology Development Center System Coordinating 12 Board. These costs can be absorbed within each system's existing budgeted resources.'

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SUMMARY

This amendment changes the name of the system to permit early-stage development of technology-based businesses from the 20 Applied Technology Center System to the Applied Technology 22 Development Center System. The amendment moves the administration of the system from the Maine Technology Institute 24 to the Department of Economic and Community Development and adds a representative of the Maine Technology Institute to the Applied Technology Development Center System Coordinating Board. 26 The amendment sets a limit on the amount of state funding each center 28 may receive. The amendment authorizes the Department of Economic and Community Development to adopt routine technical rules. The amendment appropriates funds to the Target Technology Center at 30 Orono. Finally, the amendment decreases the appropriation of 32 funds to the Applied Technology Development Center System and clarifies that applicants for these funds do not have to be new centers to be eligible for funding. 34
