Part GGGG provides an income tax deduction for public and private pension income to the extent that the pension income, together with social security benefits and railroad retirement benefits, does not exceed \$6,000 in tax years beginning in 2000, 2001 or 2002; \$8,000 for tax years beginning in 2003 or 2004; and \$10,000 for tax years beginning on or after January 1, 2005. This Part makes no change to the current law that exempts all social security and railroad retirement benefits from state income tax.

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PART HHHH

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Part HHHH provides for full indexing of the individual income tax brackets for tax years beginning on or after January 1, 2001.

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PART IIII

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Part IIII provides an income tax exemption for individuals of up to \$1,500 of net long-term capital gains for tax years beginning on or after January 1, 2001.

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PART JJJJ

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Part JJJJ provides that the personal exemption of the state individual income is the same as the personal exemption for purposes of the federal income tax for tax years beginning on or after January 1, 2001.

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PART KKKK

Part KKKK eliminates the prepayment of 1/2 of the next year's tax on telecommunications personal property.

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PART LLLL

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Part LLLL requires that revenues deposited into the Fund for a Healthy Maine that are less than estimated for programs and services supported by the Fund for a Healthy Maine must be reduced proportionately to their share of the overall fund, except the Medical Care - Payments to Providers program.

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Part LLLL also amends the law to eliminate the requirement that the Fund for a Healthy Maine return a working capital advance to the General Fund.

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Part LLLL also provides allocations in 5 areas. It allocates 10% of estimated tobacco settlement revenue to the Trust Fund for a Healthy Maine. The Partnership for a Tobacco-free Maine is funded to create a support system for those

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Part UUUU establishes the transfers to the Retirement Allowance Fund as the first priority of the surplus revenue at the close of each fiscal year and increases the amount of that transfer to 1/2 the surplus revenue. The Maine Rainy Day Fund would receive 1/2 of the balance of the excess after the Retirement Allowance Fund transfer, or 1/4 of the surplus revenue. A similar change in the priority of claims for certain increases of General Fund revenue estimates is also included in this Part.

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Part UUUU also establishes a Debt Avoidance Fund that would receive the remainder of the excess revenue after the transfers to the Retirement Allowance Fund and the Maine Rainy Day Fund. The Debt Avoidance Fund is established to avoid the issuance of bonds authorized by the voters but as yet unissued.

PART VVVV

Part VVVV includes several initiatives related to long-term care, including amendments to address labor force issues in the nursing field, develop standardized contracts, provide default
