Part MMMM expands the eligibility of the Cub Care program to children who have not attained one year of age. It also allocates funds from the Fund for a Healthy Maine to the Department of Human Services for fiscal year 2000-01 for that purpose.

Part NNNN establishes a new position of school nurse consultant jointly within the Department of Human Services and the Department of Education. Part QQQQ requires the Commissioner of Administrative and Financial Services to attempt to sell or lease the property currently located at the Maine Criminal Justice Academy in Waterville at its fair market value.
