An additional General Fund appropriation of 2 \$23,290 is included for the additional administrative costs of the Bureau of Revenue Services in fiscal year 2000-01. Ongoing 4 administrative costs are estimated to be approximately \$34,000 б annually beginning in fiscal year 2001-02.

8 Part T will result in net reductions of General Fund revenue of \$2,853,504 in fiscal year 2000-01, \$9,256,226 in fiscal year 2001-02 and \$16,041,231 in fiscal year 2002-03 as a result of the 10 changes to the individual income tax brackets. Part T will also reduce dedicated revenue to the Local Government Fund for 12 state-municipal revenue sharing by \$153,350 in fiscal year 14 2000-01, \$497,437 in fiscal year 2001-02 and \$862,068 in fiscal year 2002-03.

Part U will result in net reductions of General Fund revenue 18 of \$1,005,151 in fiscal year 2000-01, \$4,064,788 in fiscal year 2001-02 and \$4,243,727 in fiscal year 2002-03 as a result of the 20 individual income tax exemption for pension income. Part U will also reduce dedicated revenue to the Local Government Fund for 22 state-municipal revenue sharing by \$54,018 in fiscal year 2000-01, \$218,445 in fiscal year 2001-02 and \$228,061 in fiscal The Bureau of Revenue Services will incur 24 year 2002-03. additional administrative costs of approximately \$32,000 in 26 fiscal year 2001-02 and \$34,000 annually beginning in fiscal year 2002-03.

Part V will result in net reductions of General Fund revenue

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of \$587,549 in fiscal year 2000-01, \$2,733,512 in fiscal year 30 2001-02 and \$7,413,358 in fiscal year 2002-03 as a result of the 32 earned income tax credit. Part V will also reduce dedicated revenue to the Local Government Fund for state-municipal revenue sharing by \$31,575 in fiscal year 2000-01, \$146,901 in fiscal 34 year 2001-02 and \$398,400 in fiscal year 2002-03. 36

Part W will result in a one-time reduction of General Fund 38 revenue of \$14,400,000 in fiscal year 1999-00.

Part X will result in net reductions of General Fund revenue 40 of \$867,386 in fiscal year 1999-00, \$495,670 in fiscal year 2000-01 and \$307,914 in fiscal year 2001-02 as a result of the 42 conformity for deductibility of the self-employed health Part X will also reduce dedicated revenue 44 insurance deduction. to the Local Government Fund for state-municipal revenue sharing by \$46,614 in fiscal year 1999-00, \$26,638 in fiscal year 2000-01 46 and \$16,548 in fiscal year 2001-02.

The individual income tax, corporate income tax and sales tax changes in this bill will result in net reductions of 50

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dedicated revenue to the Local Government Fund for
state-municipal revenue sharing totaling \$1,852 in fiscal year
1999-00, \$1,378,989 in fiscal year 2000-01, \$1,785,170 in fiscal
year 2001-02 and \$2,530,572 in fiscal year 2002-03.

6 Part Z repeals the repeal date of the Maine Environmental Protection Fund fee schedule, resulting in the continued 8 collection of fees that otherwise would not have been available to support the costs of staff associated with license activities.

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Part CC removes state police officers hired after September 12 15, 1984 and a special agent investigator hired before June 21, 1982 from the 1998 Special Retirement Plan, increasing the 14 unfunded liability of the Maine State Retirement System by \$2,740,880. Since the Constitution of Maine, Article IX, Section 16 18-A, prohibits the creation of unfunded liabilities except those that result from experience losses, this bill includes a one-time 18 General Fund appropriation of \$2,740,880 to cover the estimated General Fund cost of \$886,374, the estimated Highway Fund cost of 20 \$1,445,424 and the cost to accounts in other funds, estimated to be \$409,082. 22

Removing these state police officers and the special agent 24 investigator from the 1998 Special Retirement Plan will also increase the normal cost component of the employer retirement 26 rate from the 1998 special plan rate of 6.89% to the new plan normal cost rate of 9.15%. This 2.26% increase will result in 28 increased employer contributions to the Maine State Retirement System for these employees estimated to be \$146,292 in fiscal 30 year 2000-01. A General Fund appropriation of \$124,475 is included to cover the General Fund cost of \$47,386 and the 32 Highway Fund cost of \$77,089 in fiscal year 2000-01 to provide funds in the salary plan account to be held in reserve in the 34 event that the increase in the employer retirement contribution rates exceeds the allotments in General Fund and Highway Fund 36 accounts during fiscal year 2000-01. The cost to accounts in other funds, estimated to be \$21,817 in fiscal year 2000-01, may 38 require increased allotments to meet these additional personal services expenditures.

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Part DD establishes the Retiree Health Insurance Internal Service Fund to be supported with access to the General Fund's unappropriated surplus at the end of fiscal year 2000-01 and beyond. The amount of funds that will be available for transfer from General Fund unappropriated surplus at the end of each fiscal year can not be determined at this time.

Part LL reduces the statutory amortization schedule for the
 Maine State Retirement System unfunded liability from 25 years to
 19 years starting in fiscal year 2000-01. This will result in

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General Fund appropriations and Highway Fund allocations and
allocations from other funds in fiscal years 2001-02 and 2002-03
being greater than they otherwise might have been due to the
favorable experience in the unfunded liability. This change will, however, produce significant amortization savings over the
next 19 years.

8 Part MM increases the debt service limit from \$74,000,000 to \$80,000,000 in fiscal year 2002-03 and from \$80,000,000 to \$84,000,000 in fiscal year 2004-05, resulting in additional 10 General Fund debt service costs to the Department of Education, 12 General Purpose Aid for Local Schools program beginning in fiscal Future additional General Fund appropriations, year 2003-04. 14 estimated to be \$4,200,000 in fiscal year 2003-04 and \$7,000,000 in fiscal year 2004-05, will be required for these additional 16 debt service costs. Part MM also requires the State Board of Education to conduct a study and submit a required report and the 18 State Board of Education and the Department of Education to adopt rules to create a plan regarding major capital improvements. 20 These costs can be absorbed by the board and the department utilizing existing budgeted resources.

- 22 Part PP authorizes the payment of recruitment and retention 24 adjustments for 2 positions in the Department of Administrative and Financial Services. These costs will be absorbed by the 26 department utilizing existing budgeted resources.
- 28 Part QQ retains retirement provisions for employees of the Bangor Pre-Release Center. The Department of Corrections may 30 incur additional unbudgeted retirement costs beginning in fiscal year 2001-02 associated with the retention of retirement 32 provisions for the employees affected by the closure of the Bangor Pre-Release Center. 34

Part UU requires that interest earned or other investment income resulting from the Fund for a Healthy Maine must be transferred to the General Fund. The amount of additional revenue that will be deposited to the General Fund beginning in fiscal year 2000-01 can not be determined at this time.

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Part YY increases the state share of retired teachers' 42 health insurance from 30% to 35% beginning July 1, 2001. The estimated additional General Fund appropriations that will be 44 needed to fund this increase in fiscal years 2001-02 and 2002-03 will be approximately \$780,961 and \$874,676, respectively.

Part ZZ includes a General Fund appropriation of \$50,000 in 48 fiscal year 2000-01 for the Department of Public Safety to provide initial funding for state death benefits for law 50 enforcement officers killed in the line of duty. The Department

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of Public Safety will also require additional General Fund 2 appropriations and Highway Fund allocations if more than one benefit payment is made in fiscal year 2000-01. The amounts can 4 not be determined at this time.

Part BBB establishes the order of priority of transfers of 6 excess revenue at the end of each fiscal year. The Retirement 8 Allowance Fund is established as the first priority and its share of the excess revenue is increased. The Maine Rainy Day Fund is established as the second priority and its share of the excess 10 revenue is decreased. This Part also establishes the Debt 12 Avoidance Fund to avoid the issuance of debt authorized by the voters but not yet issued. The net impact of this Part on the amounts to be transferred to the Maine Rainy Day Fund, Retirement 14 Allowance Fund, Debt Avoidance Fund and the amounts available in 16 the General Fund for other purposes can not be determined at this The net fiscal impact of any transfers to the Debt time. 18 Avoidance Fund on the amount of bonds issued and future debt service costs also can not be determined at this time.

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Part CCC requires that all federal reimbursement funds 22 received by the Department of Mental Health, Mental Retardation and Substance Abuse Services related to the construction of the 24 new psychiatric treatment facility in Augusta must be deposited in the Maine State Retirement System Retirement Allowance Fund to 26 reduce the unfunded liability. The total estimated amount that may be received from federal reimbursement funds related to the 28 construction costs for this facility is approximately \$36,725,358. The amount that will be received in each fiscal 30 year can not be determined at this time.

 Part DDD establishes the Governor Baxter School for the Deaf Student Trust Fund and requires a transfer of \$1,000,000 from the
 Victims' Compensation Fund administered by the Department of the Attorney General. The impact of this transfer on the Victims'
 Compensation Fund can not be determined at this time.

38 Part EEE increases the maximum amount that the Victims' Compensation Board may award to the victim or family of the 40 victim. The impact of this increase on the Victims' Compensation Fund can not be determined at this time.
