## An Act to Create a State-sponsored Voluntary Logger Certification Program.

	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
2	Sec. 1. 12 MRSA §8004 is enacted to read:
4	§8004. Voluntary Logger Certification Program

	1. Program developed: core components. The bureau, in
8	cooperation with the Maine Technical College System, the University of Maine Cooperative Extension Service, the University
10	of Maine College of Natural Sciences, Forestry and Agriculture and the Maine chapter of the American Red Cross, shall develop a
12	low-cost, voluntary logger certification program, referred to in
14	this section as the "program," to be offered at various locations across the State. The program must include, at a minimum, the
16	following core components, which must be completed within a 2-year period by the applicant:
18	A. Standard adult first aid and emergency medical response training;
20	B. Best management practices and chain saw safety;
22	C. Timber harvesting laws; and
24	D. Fundamentals of forestry.
26	2. Bligibility. The following persons are eligible to
28	participate in the program:
30	A. A person who is gainfully employed in the harvesting of timber; and
32	
34	B. A person who is an owner, contractor or employee of a business whose primary work is the harvesting of timber.
36	For purposes of this subsection, the harvesting of timber includes manual or mechanical felling, limbing, bucking,
38	skidding, trucking or chipping of timber.
40	3. Reciprocity. A person who is a resident of New Hampshire, who is certified by that state's professional loggers
42	program and who conducts 25% or more of that person's business in
44	<u>this State may be granted reciprocal logger certification under</u> this subsection.
46	4. Term; recertification. A certificate issued under this
48	section is valid for a period of 4-years. To maintain continued certification after the 4-year period has expired, the certified
	applicant must complete 24 hours of related continuing education
50	programs or public service. The bureau shall determine the

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public service or continuing education programs that qualify for purposes of recertification. 2 5. Advisory board. An advisory board is established to 4 assist and advise the bureau in the establishment and implementation of the program. The advisory board includes, but 6 is not limited to, one representative each from the following 8 entities: A. A statewide small woodland owners association of Maine; 10 12 B. A statewide farm bureau; C. The University of Maine Cooperative Extension Service; 14 16 D The University of Maine College of Natural Sciences, Forestry and Agriculture; 18 E. A statewide professional loggers association; 20 F. The Maine Forest Products Council; and 22 G. A statewide pulpwood association. 24 SUMMARY 26 28 This bill directs the Department of Conservation, Bureau of Forestry to develop a low-cost, voluntary logger certification 30

 program. The program must include training in first aid and emergency medical response, best management practices and chain
saw safety, timber harvesting laws and the fundamentals of forestry.
