- Examine options for broadening ownership through employee, consumer and community forms of ownership in firms operating in the State;
- 5. Study the feasibility of establishing an employee ownership feasibility program and fund to provide grants to employees of businesses in the State to be used for purposes of analyzing the potential for employee ownership;
- 6. Make recommendations on the eligibility criteria for an employee ownership feasibility program; and
 - 7. Study and make recommendations for an education and outreach program for Maine businesses on employee ownership options; and be it further
 - Sec. 5. Staff assistance. Resolved: That the State Planning Office in the Executive Department shall provide necessary staffing services to the commission; and be it further

Resolved: That the members of the commission who are Legislators are entitled to receive the legislative per diem as defined in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 3, section 2 and reimbursement for travel and other necessary expenses for attendance at meetings of the commission. Public members not otherwise compensated by their employers or other entities that they represent are entitled to receive reimbursement of necessary expenses for their attendance at authorized meetings of the commission; and be it further
 - Sec. 7. Report. Resolved: That the commission shall submit a final report along with any recommended legislation to the First Regular Session of the 120th Legislature. The final report must be submitted no later than November 15, 2000. If the commission requires an extension of time to make its report, it may apply to the Legislative Council, which may grant the extension; and be it further
 - Sec. 8. Commission budget. Resolved: That the chairs of the commission, with assistance from the commission staff, shall administer the commission budget. Within 10 days after its first meeting, the commission shall present a work plan and proposed

SUMMARY

18 This amendment changes the bill to a resolve. It deletes the establishment of an employee ownership feasibility fund and 20 deletes the establishment of an education and outreach program for Maine businesses on employee ownership options. It adds to 22 the duties of the Commission to Study Ownership Patterns in Maine the duty to study the feasibility of an employee ownership 24 feasibility program and fund and the duty to make recommendations for an education and outreach program for Maine businesses on 26 employee ownership options. The amendment also makes changes to the membership of the commission and changes the due date of the 28 commission's final report to November 15, 2000. Finally, the amendment adds a fiscal note.
