SUMMARY

This bill implements the recommendations of the Task Force to Study the Operation of and Support for the Board of Environmental Protection. The bill allocates funds for an Executive Director of the Board of Environmental Protection position and sets the salary level of the executive director within salary range 86, which is the range of the Executive Director of the Maine Land Use Regulation Commission's salary. The bill also specifies that the executive director directs the daily administrative and operational functions of the board and may be removed by majority vote of the board.

The bill amends the conflict of interest provision as it applies to the board to require the board to provide a nonbinding advisory opinion as to whether a member has a conflict of interest that may require abstention from a proceeding, unless the member in question objects to the vote.

The bill amends the rule-making procedures as they apply to the board to require the board to accept and consider additional public comment on a proposed rule following the close of the formal rule-making comment period provided that the additional public comment is directly related to comments received during the formal rule-making comment period or is in response to changes to the proposed rule.

The bill also provides for the transfer of funding for the Deputy Commissioner of the Department of Environmental Protection position from the Board of Environmental Protection Fund to the General Fund.
