Sec. 3. Study of use of emotional, behavioral and developmental delay 22 categories in identification of exceptional students and preschool handicapped children. The Department of Education shall study and compare the rate of identification of exceptional students and 24 preschool handicapped children using emotional and behavioral indicators among school units within the State and between the 26 State and other states. The department shall analyze the use of 28 emotional and behavioral indicators within the State to identify inconsistencies and instances of over-identification and 30 under-identification. The department shall also study the appropriateness and likely impact of including developmental delay for children from 5 to 9 years of age and from birth to 5 32 years of age as a component in the definitions of "exceptional student" and "preschool handicapped child" in the Maine Revised 34 Statutes, Title 20-A, section 7001. The department shall issue an interim report on the status of its study to the joint 36 standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over 38 education matters no later than March 1, 2001. The department shall issue its final report, including findings and to the 40 recommendations, joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over education matters no later 42 than February 1, 2002. The committee may introduce legislation concerning the use of emotional, behavioral and developmental 44 delay categories in the identification of exceptional students and preschool handicapped children to the Second Regular Session of the 120th Legislature. 46

48 Sec. 4. Retroactivity. Those sections of this Act that enact the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 20-A, section 7001, subsection
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2	paragraph C, subparagraph 6-A and subsection 4, paragraph C, subparagraph 6-A take effect retroactively to June 30, 2000.
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	SUMMARY
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	This bill is reported by the Joint Standing Committee on
8	Education and Cultural Affairs pursuant to Public Law 1999,
	chapter 424, Part A, section 11. The bill extends to June 30,
10	2002 the use of emotional disability as an identifying factor in
	the identification of exceptional children from birth to 9 years
12	of age. The bill also directs the Department of Education to
	study the impact of the use of emotional and behavioral
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14	indicators and the likely impact of the use of developmental
	delay categories in the identification of exceptional children.
