	Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts of the Legislature do not
2	become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and
4	Whereas, the Legislature wishes to extend the opportunity to
6	purchase lifetime hunting and fishing licenses to persons from 6 to 15 years of age; and

10	Whereas, those licenses will be available by January 1, 2001; and
12	Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of
14	Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and

18	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

24	1. Infants and seniors. The following resident lifetime licenses may be purchased en-and-after-January-1,-2000:

A person who is 70 years of age or older is entitled to receive a complimentary lifetime license under section 7076, subsection 1.

Sec. 2. Adult lifetime hunting and fishing licenses. Adult resident lifetime hunting and fishing licenses and adult resident combination hunting and fishing licenses must be available on and after January 1, 2006 to residents from 16 to 64 years of age. In January of 2005, the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife shall submit its recommendations on the fees for such licenses to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over inland fisheries and wildlife matters. Those recommendations may include different fees for different adult age groups and must include recommendations on fees for an optional adult supersport lifetime hunting and fishing licenses for each recommended age group. The joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over inland fisheries and wildlife matters may report out a bill to the First Regular Session of the 122nd Legislature to implement a fee structure for adult lifetime hunting and fishing licenses.

18	The establishment of certain lifetime hunting and fishing
20	licenses will increase General Fund revenue collected by the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife by \$55,250 in fiscal
22	year 2000-01. The estimated future increase is \$110,500 for each of fiscal years 2001-02 and 2002-03. The bill includes an
24	additional General Fund appropriation of \$55,250 in fiscal year 2000-01 to meet the constitutional requirement that
26	appropriations to the department are at least equal to the undedicated revenues collected by the department.
28	The Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife will incur
30 32	some minor additional costs to submit a required report to the Legislature. These costs can be absorbed within the department's existing budgeted resources.

36	SUMMARY
38	This bill is reported out unanimously by the Joint Standing Committee on Inland Fisheries and Wildlife pursuant to House Paper 1866.
40	
42	The bill makes lifetime hunting and fishing licenses available in January of 2001 for residents from 6 to 15 years of age, inclusive. The bill also creates a sliding scale fee for
44	the existing senior lifetime licenses and clarifies that persons 70 years of age or older remain entitled to a complimentary
46	lifetime hunting and fishing license.
48	The bill also requires that adult lifetime hunting and
	fishing licenses be available in January of 2006 for persons from

- Fisheries and Wildlife to submit its recommendations for a fee structure for such licenses to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over inland fisheries and
- wildlife matters in January of 2005. That committee may then report out a bill to the first regular session of the 122nd
- 6 Legislature to implement a fee structure for the adult lifetime hunting and fishing licenses.
