20	advise and make policy recommendations to the Governor, the Children's Cabinet, the Legislature and the judiciary regarding

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§19123. Duties

The council shall meet at least 3 times a year and shall report each year to the Governor, the Children's Cabinet 14 established in chapter 439, the Legislature and the judiciary on its review of the progress made in meeting the goals cited in 16 section 19122 and its policy recommendations and other proposals 18 for meeting those goals in the forthcoming year. A copy of the report must be submitted to the joint standing committee of the 20 Legislature having jurisdiction over appropriations and financial affairs, the joint standing committee of the Legislature having 22 jurisdiction over criminal justice matters, the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over education and cultural affairs and the joint standing committee of the 24 Legislature having jurisdiction over health and human services 26 matters. A copy of the report must be made available to the public.

§19124. Staffing; administration

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Staffing assistance for the council must be coordinated by the Office of the Governor. The council may request additional 32 staffing assistance from the Legislative Council. Staffing assistance provided by the Legislative Council must be secondary 34 to the staffing coordinated by the Office of the Governor. All 36 funds received by and appropriated for the council must be coordinated by the Office of the Governor.

CHILDREN'S CABINET

§19131. Children's Cabinet

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§19134. Funds

The cabinet is authorized to solicit, receive and pool funds 14from the Federal Government, any political subdivision of the State or any individual, foundation or corporation and may expend those funds for purposes that are consistent with this chapter. 16

18 §19135. Annual report

20 The cabinet shall provide an annual report to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over 22 appropriations and financial affairs, the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over criminal 24 justice matters, the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over education and cultural affairs and the 26 joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over health and human services matters, the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court and the Council on Children and Families. A copy 28 of the report must be made available to the public.

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Sec. 7. Guiding principles. Consistent with the purposes of the Children's Cabinet established under this Act and recognizing 32 that children's needs are best met within the context of 34 relationships within the child's family and community, the child and family serving system must ensure that:

- A. Every child has the opportunity to be a child and has access to the education, resources and support to become a 38 healthy and productive adult;
- в. Every family recognizes the responsibilities and rewards 42 of raising children and is provided the support necessary to fulfill the family role;
- Supporting children to reach their full potential is a C. 46 shared community responsibility that includes establishing and modeling clear standards of behavior; and
- State agencies collaboratively support families and D. communities, keeping family and children at the center of 50 all decisions.

2 Sec. 8. Appropriation. The additional costs associated with providing staffing 38 assistance to the council, if requested to do so during the 40 interim between legislative sessions, can be absorbed by the Legislature utilizing existing budgeted resources. Ιf the council requires staffing assistance during the legislative 42 session, the Legislature may require an additional General Fund 44 appropriation to contract for staff services. 46 The Office of the Governor, the Department of Corrections, the Department of Education, the Department of Human Services, the Department of Mental Health, Mental Retardation and Substance 48 Abuse Services, the Department of Public Safety and the Judicial

Department will incur some minor additional costs to participate in the council and the Children's Cabinet and to submit the report required of the cabinet. These costs can be absorbed within the departments' existing budgeted resources.

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SUMMARY

This bill establishes the Council on Children and Families Governor, certain state departments, 10 to advise the the Legislature and the judiciary regarding the following goals: to encourage a coordinated system of education and services for 12 children and families, to evaluate the allocation of resources, to promote coordinated budgets and policy, to evaluate program 14 effectiveness and to promote an informal information exchange. 16 membership of 13 includes 5 commissioners of The state departments, a judge and 7 Legislators. Staffing is provided primarily by the Governor's office, which also administers the 18 budget.

This bill ensures that the Governor's Children's Cabinet, 22 and the resultant collaboration on children's policy development and program implementation that it has created, will continue beyond the end of the current administration. 24 Codifying the Governor's Children's Cabinet in statute and endorsing the 26 expectation of interdepartmental program coordination and the use of so-called "pooled-flexible funds" to provide integrated 28 programs and services to children and families was one of the recommendations of the Task Force to Study the Implementation of 30 Alternative Programs and Interventions for Violent and Chronically Disruptive Students.
