## An Act to Criminalize the Possession of Theft Tools.

	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
2	Sec. 1. 17-A MRSA §363 is enacted to read:
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б	\$363. Possession or transfer of theft tools
8	<b>1.</b> A person is guilty of possession or transfer of theft tools if that person:
10	A. Possesses or makes any tool, implement, instrument or other article that is adapted, designed or commonly used for
12	advancing or facilitating crimes involving theft of property, including, but not limited to, a theft detection
14	shielding device or a theft detection device deactivator or remover, with intent to use such tool, implement, instrument
16	or other article to commit any such criminal offense; or
18	B. Transfers or possesses with the intent to transfer any device described in paragraph A that that person knows is
20	designed or primarily useful for the commission of a crime described in paragraph A.
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24	<b>2.</b> Possession or transfer of theft tools in violation of subsection 1, paragraph B is a Class D crime. Possession or transfer of theft tools in violation of subsection 1, paragraph A
26	is a Class E crime.
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30	SUMMARY
32	This bill prohibits the possession or transfer of tools used to commit theft. It is based on the laws in this State that prohibit the possession or transfer of tools used to commit
34	burglary.
