SENATE AMENDMENT "*A*" to COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" to H.P. 224, L.D. 259, Bill, "An Act to Offer Reciprocity Concerning Concealed Firearms Permits"

Amend the amendment in subsection 7 in the first paragraph in the 6th line (page 1, line 30 in amendment) by inserting after the following: "with" the following: '2'

Further amend the amendment by striking out all of section 3 and inserting in its place the following:

'Sec. 3. Report. The Chief of the State Police shall report to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over criminal justice matters by January 15, 2003 regarding the costs and resources involved in entering into reciprocity agreements with other states pursuant to the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 25, section 2001, subsection 7.'

FISCAL NOTE

Limiting the number of states with which the Chief of the State Police can enter into reciprocity agreements for the recognition of permits to carry concealed weapons will remove the need for General Fund appropriations. The additional costs associated with administering a limited reciprocity program can be absorbed by the State Police utilizing existing budgeted resources.

These same limitations in the reciprocity program will reduce the estimated loss of dedicated revenue collected from



concealed weapons permit fees. The limited reciprocity program
will result in insignificant reductions of dedicated revenue to
the Department of Public Safety from permit fees.

SUMMARY

This amendment limits to 2 the number of states with which
the Chief of the State Police may enter into reciprocity
agreements for the recognition of permits to carry concealed
weapons. This amendment also requires the Chief of the State
Police by January 15, 2003 to report to the joint standing
committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over criminal
justice matters regarding the cost, in money and other resources,
of entering into these reciprocity agreements.
