	1. Court action. A person who suffers any loss of money or
12	property, real or personal, as a result of the act of another
	person who intentionally or knowingly introduces or allows the
14	introduction of a computer virus into any computer resource,
	having no reasonable ground to believe that the person has a
16	right to do so in violation of Title 17-A, section 433,
10	subsection 1, paragraph C may bring an action either in the
18	Superior Court or District Court for actual treble damages, restitution and for such other equitable relief as the court
20	determines to be necessary and proper. There is a right to trial
20	by jury in any action brought in Superior Court under this
22	section.
24	2. Fees and costs. A successful plaintiff in an action
	under this section is entitled to reasonable attorney's fees and
26	costs incurred in connection with that action.
28	3. Notices to Attorney General. Upon commencement of any
30	action brought under subsection 1, the clerk of courts shall mail a copy of the complaint or other initial pleading to the Attorney
30	General and upon entry of any judgment or decree in the action,

	paragraph C. A person who suffers damage because of the virus
44	may bring an action either in the Superior Court or District
	Court for actual treble damages, restitution and for such other
46	equitable relief. A successful plaintiff in an action also is
	entitled to reasonable attorney's fees and costs incurred in
48	connection with that action.
