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concentration that does not exceed 0.3% on a dry weight basis and that is grown under a federal permit and in compliance with the conditions of that permit.

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Sec. 3. Authorization for the Maine Agricultural Experiment Station to study the cultivation of industrial hemp. The Director of the Maine Agricultural Experiment Station may develop a study to explore the feasibility and desirability of industrial hemp production in this State. The study may include an analysis of required soils growing conditions, seed availability and varieties, including in-the-ground seed variety trials, harvest methods, market economies and environmental benefits. undertaking a study, the director, in consultation with the Commissioner of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources, shall obtain all federal permits needed to legally grow industrial hemp for fiber or seed production prior to importing any nonsterilized industrial hemp seeds capable of germination into the State.

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Sec. 4. Directive to the Commissioner of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources. The Commissioner of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources shall write to the Secretary of Agriculture, United States Department of Agriculture and the Administrator of the Drug Enforcement Agency within the United States Department of Justice to express the department's support for research on the cultivation and economic benefits of industrial hemp and for the development of appropriate regulations to allow the domestic production of industrial hemp if research indicates industrial hemp has significant potential as a commercial agricultural crop. In expressing support, the commissioner may refer to the Industrial Hemp Petition presented to the United States Department of Agriculture and the Drug Enforcement Administration in March 1998 by a coalition of farmers, businesses and environmental groups and to the successful cultivation and regulation of industrial hemp in Canada.'

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Further amend the bill by inserting at the end before the summary the following:

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'FISCAL NOTE

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The additional enforcement costs can be absorbed by the Department of Public Safety and the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources utilizing existing budgeted resources.

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The Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources will incur some minor additional costs to communicate in writing with certain federal agencies concerning the cultivation and economic benefits of industrial hemp. These costs can be absorbed within the department's existing budgeted resources.

The Maine Agricultural Experiment Station within the University of Maine System may incur some minor additional costs if it conducts a study on the cultivation of industrial hemp. These costs can be absorbed within the station's existing budgeted resources.

The Judicial Department may realize some minor savings from reductions of workload and administrative costs associated with the minimal number of cases that will no longer be filed in the court system. Reductions in the collection of fines may decrease General Fund revenue by minor amounts.'

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16 SUMMARY

This amendment replaces the original bill. It is the minority report. It enacts a definition of "industrial hemp." It authorizes, but does not require, the Director of the Maine Agricultural Experiment Station to obtain the appropriate federal permits to study the feasibility of growing industrial hemp. It directs the Commissioner of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources to write to federal agencies expressing support for research and appropriate regulation to allow the cultivation of industrial hemp if research indicates it has significant potential as an agricultural crop.

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
