	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
2	Sec. 1. 20-A MRSA §5001-A, sub-§1, as enacted by PL 1983, c.
4	806, §49, is amended to read:
6	1. Requirement. Persons 7 6 years of age or older and under 17 15 years shall attend a public day school during the
8	time it is in regular session.

12 14	2. Exceptions. Attendance at school shall is not be required of the following:

	This bill changes the compulsory school attendance
6	requirement from 7 years of age or older and under 17 years of age to 6 years of age or older and under 16 years of age.

	This bill improves the academic focus of schools by
10	requiring earlier entry to school. It removes the negativity associated with the truancy issues of older teens who often
12	detract from the academic atmosphere of the school.
