	§9001. Definitions
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12	As used in this chapter, unless the context otherwise indicates, the following terms have the following meanings.
14	1. Activities of daily living. "Activities of daily
	living" means eating, dressing, bathing, bathroom use, personal
16	hygiene, moving between locations and transferring between
	surfaces such as a wheelchair or a standing position.
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20	2. Assessing services agency. "Assessing services agency" means an organization authorized through a written agreement with
20	the department to conduct face-to-face assessments, using the
22	department's medical eligibility determination form, to determine
	the functional eligibility for covered services of prospective
24	residents of assisted living facilities. The assessing services
2.5	agency is the department's authorized agent for functional
26	eligibility determinations.
28	3. Assisted living. "Assisted living" means an apartment
	community:
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	A. Designed specifically to meet the needs of persons who
32	require assistance with some activities of daily living or
34	instrumental activities of daily living or both;
34	B. With staff on site 24 hours per day and that provides
36	meals, personal care assistance, monitoring and
	administering of medications, housekeeping, laundry,
38	transportation and social and recreational activities;
40	C. With lockable doors, individual temperature controls,
42	and a living room, bedroom, private bathroom and kitchen or
42	<u>kitchenette; or</u>
44	D. That emphasizes privacy, independence, choice, dignity
	and individuality.
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	4. Consumer. "Consumer" means a resident of an assisted
48	living facility who uses supportive services such as meals,
50	personal care assistance and monitoring of medications.
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5. Facility. "Facility" means an assisted living facility 2 serving low-income citizens of the State that is licensed as Type 111 or Type IV congregate housing services programs in accordance 4 with the rules of the department.

 6 6. Instrumental activities of daily living. "Instrumental activities of daily living" means meal preparation, taking
 8 medication, using the telephone, handling finances, shopping, light housekeeping, heavy housekeeping and traveling to
 10 appointments.

12 7, Low income. "Low income" means having a household income that does not exceed 80% of the median household income, 14 adjusted for family size, for the county in which the facility is located.

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8. Nursing facility. "Nursing facility" means a facility
 in which nursing care and medical services are prescribed by or
 performed under the general direction of person licensed to
 practice medicine or surgery in the State for the accommodation
 of convalescent or other persons who are not acutely ill and not
 in need of care in a hospital but who require skilled nursing
 care and related medical servcies 24 hours per day because of
 illness, disease or physical or mental infirmity.

9. Residential care facility. "Residential care facility" means a facility licensed pursuant to section 7801, including entities formerly known as adult foster homes and boarding homes but excluding adult family care homes. Level I residential care facilities are licensed for 6 or fewer residents and Level II residential care facilities are licensed for 7 or more residents.

10. Supportive services. "Supportive services" means meals, personal care assistance, monitoring and administering of medications, housekeeping, laundry, transportation and social and recreational activities including activities designed to reduce isolation and sustain a resident's mental and physical health.

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11. Unit. "Unit" means a single apartment unit with a living and dining area, separate bedroom, private bathroom and kitchen or kitchenette.

<u>§9002. New units</u>

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46 The department shall subsidize the services in 120 new
46 assisted living units for low-income citizens of the State in each biennium until the total number of such assisted living
48 units in the State reaches 3% of the number of citizens of the State who are 80 years of age or older and whose household income
50 is below 80% of the state median household income. For purposes of this section, "new units" means new construction or conversion of existing structures.

4 §9003. Funding level

6 The department shall reimburse a provider of supportive services at a facility for actual costs incurred by that provider 8 in providing the supportive services, less the aggregate revenue from the services copays pursuant to section 9004 and any additional copay revenue pursuant to section 9005, up to a 10 maximum of \$35 per day, multiplied by the number of units in the facility rented by residents eligible for reimbursement by the 12 department. The department shall index the maximum daily 14 reimbursement of \$35 per day for inflation in the long-term care industry by use of a nationally recognized and utilized measure of such inflation. 16

18 **§9004.** Services copay

 A resident of a facility may pay not less than 65% and not more than 80% of the resident's household income toward the
 combination of rent, utilities and the cost of the supportive services, including meals and personal care that are not covered
 by the State's contribution.

26 §9005. Additional copay based on resident assets

28 1. Resident assets. A resident with liquid assets over \$10,000 in constant 2001 dollars or a couple with liquid assets 30 over \$15,000 in constant 2001 dollars shall pay an additional monthly copay equal to the lesser of: 32 A. Three percent of the amount of assets that exceed 34 \$10,000 for a resident or \$15,000 for a couple in constant 2001 dollars; or 36 B. The full monthly cost of supportive services. 38 2. Indexing. The department shall index the \$10,000 and \$15,000 thresholds in subsection 1 to inflation using the 40 Consumer Price Index. 42 3. Rules. 48 **§9006.** Resident functional eligibility

avoid the copay described in subsection 1.

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	1. Persons who are eligible. Eligibility for subsidies
2	from the department toward the cost of supportive services for a
	resident entering an assisted living facility is limited to a
4	consumer who needs the following amount and type of support:
6	A. Limited assistance plus a one-person physical assist with at least 2 activities of daily living one to 2 times
8	for each activity in the past 7 days;
10	B. Limited assistance plus a one-person physical assist with one activity of daily living and assistance, including
12	physical assistance, with at least 2 instrumental activities of daily living; or

18	2. Persons who are not eligible. A person with the
10	following characteristics is not eligible for initial admission
20	to a facility:
22	A. Is unable to be alone for significant periods of time, including overnight;

	B. Requires a 2-person physical assist with at least one
26	activity of daily living on an ongoing basis; or
28	C. Is eligible for admission to a nursing facility.
30	3. Requirements. The department may establish requirements
	as to the income of a resident of a facility whose supportive
32	services are subsidized by the department, provided that such
2.4	requirements do not conflict with the resident income limitations
34	of public and private sources of capital to the facility. The department may not establish requirements as to the income of a
36	resident of a facility whose supportive services are not
00	subsidized by the department.
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	4. Assessment. A provider of services may conduct its own
40	assessments of the functional eligibility of a prospective resident of an assisted living facility using an eligibility
42	determination form prescribed by the department. Alternatively,
	the department may employ an assessing services agency to assess
44	the functional eligibility for covered services of prospective
1.5	residents of assisted living facilities, provided that the cost
46	of the assessment conducted by the assessing services agency may
48	not affect the amount of reimbursement available to the provider of supportive services in the facility. An assessing services
T U	agency may not prescribe which resident may enter the facility.
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The assessing services agency may prescribe which resident is eligible for reimbursement of covered services by the department.

 5. Determinations of eligibility. A determination of resident income eligibility for the housing portion of assisted
 living is carried out by the owner of the facility or its designated management agent and may not be carried out by an
 assisted services agency.

10 §9007. Distribution of funds

12 Funds appropriated pursuant to this chapter are available through the department to new assisted living facilities by means 14 of a competitive request for proposal process. The department shall consider the following 2 criteria exclusively in selecting 16 proposals to fund:

- 18 **1. Qualifications.** The qualifications of an applicant to provide services; and
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Unmet need. The unmet need for assisted living units
 affordable to low-income citizens in the area of the State in which the project is proposed. In assessing this need, the
 department shall analyze the number of assisted living units in the area affordable to low-income persons, relative to the number
 of low-income persons in the area 80 years of age or older. The department may not use data describing the availability of beds
 in residential care facilities or other forms of long-term care that are not assisted living.

§9008. Coverage of all assisted living facilities in State

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Notwithstanding any other provision of this Title, this chapter covers all assisted living facilities serving low-income citizens of the State with support from the department, including those developed prior to the effective date of this Act.
