An Act to Establish the Maine Boating Safety Advisory Council.

Presented by Senator SAWYER of Penobscot. Cosponsored by Representative COWGER of Hallowell and Senator NUTTING of Androscoggin, Representatives: DUGAY of Cherryfield, HONEY of Boothbay. **Emergency preamble. Whereas,** Acts of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

Whereas, because recreational boating in the State is so
diverse in types of watercraft and surface waters, and the responsibility for boating law enforcement is shared by some 6
agencies of local, state and federal government, proposed solutions often receive far less attention than they deserve; and

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Whereas, the growth of recreational boating in the State has generated a growing public and governmental concern over boating safety and boating education; and

Whereas, the Legislature considered a large number of bills 16 impacting recreational boating during the 119th legislative session; and

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Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore,

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## Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

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Sec. 2. 12 MRSA §7806 is enacted to read:

## §7806. Maine Boating Safety Advisory Council

The Maine Boating Safety Advisory Council, referred to in 40 <u>this section as the "council," is established by Title 5, section</u> 12004-I, subsection 49-C.

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 Membership; composition; terms. The Commissioner of
 Inland Fisheries and Wildlife shall solicit membership and representatives from the following organizations:

A. The United States Coast Guard;

B. The Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife;

2	C. The Department of Marine Resources:
	D. The State Planning Office;
4	E. The United States Coast Guard Auxiliary;
6	F. A boating safety and navigation education organization;
8	<u>G. A harbor master association;</u>
10 12	<u>H. A state or regional association designed to protect</u> lakes;
14	I. A statewide organization that promotes marine fishing and boating:
16	J. A statewide organization that promotes hunting and
18	freshwater fishing;
20	K. A statewide organization promoting paddle sports; and
22	L. A statewide organization representing professional guides or instructors or both.
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26	Each member may select one representative from its organization to serve on the council. Representatives must be selected every 2 years and may not serve more than 3 consecutive terms. At all
28	times the council must have a simple majority membership of nonstate and nonfederal entities. Additional members may be
30	added to the council upon written petition by the prospective member and approval by the council.
32	2. Chair. At the first meeting each year, council
34	representatives shall select a person from among the representatives to serve as chair for a one-year term. The chair
36	may not serve more than 2 terms consecutively.
38	3. Duties. The council shall advise and make policy recommendations to the Commissioner of Inland Fisheries and
40	Wildlife and the Legislature regarding boating safety and education issues, including the coordination and evaluation of
42	efforts to enforce state and federal boating regulations.
44	4. Meetings; recommendations. The council shall submit
46	recommendations, reports or plans to the Commissioner of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife and to the Joint Standing Committee on Inland Fisheries and Wildlife.
48	5. Quorum. A quorum is a majority of the current
50	representatives of the council.

2 Compensation. Representatives may not receive 6.\_\_\_ compensation except for the reimbursement of expenses incurred 4 pursuant to the duties as council representative unless otherwise compensated. 6 Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this Act takes effect when approved. 8 10 **SUMMARY** 12 This bill establishes the Maine Boating Safety Advisory Council designed to advise and provide policy recommendations to 14 the Commissioner of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife and the Joint 16 Standing Committee on Inland Fisheries and Wildlife on boating safety and education matters. The commissioner shall solicit a person from each of the following organizations to serve on the 18 council: the United States Coast Guard; the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife; the Department of Marine Resources; the 20 State Planning Office; the United States Coast Guard Auxiliary; a boating safety and navigation education organization; 22 a harbor master association; a statewide organization that promotes marine 24 fishing and boating; a state or regional association designed to protect lakes; a statewide organization that promotes hunting and freshwater fishing; a statewide organization promoting paddle 26 sports; and a statewide organization representing professional 28 quides or instructors or both. Additional members may be added to the council upon petition by the prospective member and 30 approval by the council. Each member shall select а representative to serve on the council every 2 years. Δ representative may serve no more than 3 consecutive terms. 32 Representatives shall choose a chair each year and а 34 representative may not serve more than 2 consecutive years as At all times the council must have a simple majority of chair. 36 nonstate and nonfederal members. Representatives receive no compensation except for the reimbursement of expenses incurred pursuant to their duties as council representatives unless 38 otherwise compensated by their organizations. 40
