An Act to Implement Recommendations of the Commission to Study Economically and Socially Just Policies for Foreign Investments and Foreign Purchasing by the State.

- 2 The State Purchasing Agent shall provide to bidders and those who have been awarded contracts resources to assist with 4 compliance with the state purchasing code of conduct established in this subchapter. These resources must include a list, easily 6 accessed by the public, of bidders and vendors who have adopted the state purchasing code of conduct.
 - <u>§1825-O. Rulemaking</u>
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The State Purchasing Agent shall adopt rules under this subchapter governing the award of bids. Those rules must include specific guidelines for vendors to follow in order to comply with the state purchasing code of conduct and criteria for seeking disclosure of names and addresses of vendors' suppliers and suppliers' working conditions.

18 Rules adopted under this section are major substantive rules as defined in chapter 375, subchapter II-A.

<u>§1825-P. Report</u>

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By January 15th of each year, the State Purchasing Agent 24 shall submit a report to the joint standing committee having 26 jurisdiction over state and local government matters concerning 26 the administrative and fiscal impact of the requirement that 28 vendors comply with the state purchasing code of conduct; the 28 degree of voluntary compliance with the state purchasing code of 29 conduct; the number of vendors who agreed to and the number that 30 declined to comply with the provisions of this subchapter; and 31 any other information relevant to the state purchasing code of 32 conduct.

36 Sec. 4-A. Assess implementation. Resolved: That the commission shall have at least 2 meetings in September and October 2002 to 38 assess the progress of implementation of the commission's recommendations regarding economically and socially just 40 purchasing policies by the State; and be it further

- 42 Sec. 3. Commission to Study Economically and Socially Just Policies for Foreign Investments by the State: established. The Commission to 44 Study Economically and Socially Just Policies for Foreign Investments by the State is established and referred to in this 46 section as the "commission."
- 48 **1. Commission membership; appointments.** The commission consists of 10 members:

- A. Two members from the Senate, the first appointed by the
 President of the Senate, and the 2nd appointed by the
 President Pro Tempore;
- B. Two members from the House of Representatives appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, one of whom
 is a member of a political party that does not hold a majority of seats in that body;
- C. Two members from groups involved in social investments, one appointed by the President of the Senate and one appointed by the Speaker of the House;
- D. Two members from groups involved in human rights issues, one appointed by the President of the Senate and one appointed by the Speaker of the House;
- E. One representative of the Maine State Retirement System, 20 appointed by the Governor; and
- 22 F. One member of the public appointed by the Governor.
- All appointments must be completed no later than October 1, 2001.

26 2. First meeting; chairs. The first named Senate member is the Senate chair and the first named House member is the House
 28 chair of the commission. When the appointment of all members of the commission is completed, the commission chairs shall call and
 30 convene the first meeting of the commission no later than October 31, 2001.

The commission shall study the subject of з. Duties. economically and socially just policies for foreign investment by 34 the State. The commission shall evaluate the foreign investment 36 policies of other states. In its report under subsection 6, the commission shall propose standards for investment in foreign companies by the State, taking into consideration such factors as 38 the use of child labor and the existence of exploitation of workers and unhealthy working conditions. The commission shall 40 make recommendations with regard to whether the State should 42 invest in foreign companies that oppress or mistreat their workers. The commission shall identify the possible positive and negative impacts of proposed standards on Maine workers, Maine 44 small businesses and Maine taxpayers.

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4. Staff assistance. Upon approval of the Legislative 48 Council, the Legislative Council staff shall provide necessary staffing services to the commission.

5. Compensation. The members of the commission who are 2 Legislators are entitled to the legislative per diem, as defined Δ in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 3, section 2 and incurred reimbursement for necessary expenses for their 6 attendance at authorized meetings of the commission. Other members of the commission who are not otherwise compensated by their employers or other entities that they represent are 8 entitled to receive reimbursement of necessary expenses incurred 10 for their attendance at authorized meetings of the commission.

6. Report. The commission shall submit its report, together with any necessary implementing legislation, to the Second
Regular Session of the 120th Legislature no later than December 1, 2001. If the commission requires a limited extension of time
to conclude its work, it may apply to the Legislative Council, which may grant the extension.

7. Consultant. The commission, with the approval of the
 20 Legislative Council, may contract with a consultant to provide
 professional services to assist the commission with its duties.

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8. Budget. The chair of the commission, with assistance 24 from the commission staff, shall administer the commission's budget. Within 10 days after its first meeting, the commission 26 shall present a work plan and proposed budget to the Legislative Council for approval. The commission may not incur expenses that 28 would result in the commission exceeding its approved budget. Upon request from the commission, the Executive Director of the 30 Legislative Council shall promptly provide the commission chair and staff with a status report on the commission's budget, 32 expenditures incurred and paid and available funds.

Sec. 4. Appropriation. The following funds are appropriated from the General Fund to carry out the purposes of this Act.

SUMMARY

This bill implements the recommendations of the Commission to Study Economically and Socially Just Policies for Foreign Investments and Foreign Purchasing by the State. This bill amends the commission's implementing legislation to require the commission to meet in September and October 2002 to assess the implementation of its recommendations.

This bill requires suppliers of goods and services to the State to comply with a purchasing code of conduct in order to be considered in the competitive bidding process. The bill requires the State Purchasing Agent to provide resources to bidders to assist them with compliance with the code of conduct. The State Purchasing Agent is required to adopt rules governing the award of bids and to report annually to the joint standing committee having jurisdiction over state and local government matters.

This bill also creates a new commission to study and 34 establish economically and socially just policies for foreign investment by the State.

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
