Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

Each school administrative unit shall establish a local assessment system to measure student achievement of the learning results established in section 6209. Local assessments may include portfolios, performances and demonstrations in addition to other measures of achievement. This may not be limited to commercially produced assessment tools. The local assessment system must be implemented as follows.

- 1. Technical assistance. During the 2001-2002 and 2002-2003 school years, the department shall provide technical assistance to school administrative units in developing local assessment systems and setting standards for local assessment systems. By the end of the 2003-2004 school year, the superintendent of each school administrative unit shall certify to the commissioner that the local assessment system meets these standards.
- 2. Implementation. By the end of the 2003-2004 school year, the local assessment system established pursuant to this section must be fully implemented as the measure of student progress.
- 3. High school graduation decisions. By the 2006-2007 school year, high school graduation must be determined by student achievement of the standards of the system of learning results in English language arts, health and physical education, mathematics, science and technology and social studies, based on the school administrative unit's local assessment system established pursuant to this section in addition to other

requirements as established by school board policy. By the 2009-2010 school year, high school graduation must be determined by student achievement of the standards of the system of learning results in all content areas of the system of learning results, based on the school administrative unit's assessment system established pursuant to subsection 1 in addition to other requirements as established by policy of the school board.

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38	SUMMARY
4.0	This bill addresses inconsistencies in the laws that could
40	hinder implementation of the system of learning results for students in Maine public and approved private schools. It
42	requires implementation of the system of learning results in several key places in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 20-A,
44	such as the sections of law governing the purpose of the Department of Education, the duties of the Commissioner of
46	Education and the State Board of Education, vocational programs,
	approved private schools and schools in the unorganized

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territories.

It further amends the requirements for school approval, including the requirement to have a comprehensive education plan that addresses all required plans, and establishes the importance of training and development for all school personnel as a means to implement the system of learning results. It requires a comprehensive system of local 6 and state assessments establishes a schedule for using a local assessment system as the 8 basis for program, placement and student graduation decisions. It also establishes an implementation schedule for content standards in career preparation, visual and performing arts, and 10 foreign languages that is linked to funding of essential programs 12 and services. It provides for a waiver of this requirement to be developed through rulemaking, as well as rulemaking to provide a 14 smooth transition from the current system to the system that is proposed.

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Finally, this bill provides for a system of accountability for schools where students are not meeting standards, providing assistance to these schools to support the learning of students.
