information that is confidential pursuant to this section.

Unlawful dissemination is a Class E crime that, notwithstanding Title 17-A, section 1252, subsection 2, paragraph E and Title 17-A, section 1301, subsection 1-A, paragraph E, is punishable by a fine of not more than \$500 or by imprisonment for not more than 30 days.'

Further amend the bill by relettering or renumbering any nonconsecutive Part letter or section number to read consecutively.

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SUMMARY

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This amendment requires the Maine State Police and the Commissioner of Education to report annually to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over education matters regarding delays in approving applications for certification, authorization, approval or renewal and the reasons for those delays. It provides that a person is guilty of a Class E crime punishable by a fine of not more than \$500 or by imprisonment for not more than 30 days if that person knowingly disseminates information that is confidential pursuant to the laws governing fingerprinting and criminal history record checks.
