	Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts of the Legislature do not
2	become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and
4	Whereas, it is critical that state policymakers receive
6	input from the youth of this State in order to make informed and consistent decisions regarding issues that affect youth and,
8	ultimately, all of the citizens of the State; and
LO	Whereas, this legislation establishes the Legislative Youth Advisory Council to provide such input and requires the council
12	to conduct a seminar every year in August to which the Legislature is invited; and
l.4	Whereas, in order to ensure that appointments are made in
16	sufficient time for the council members to prepare for the annual seminar in August 2001, this legislation must take effect
18	immediately; and
20	Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of
22	Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and
24	safety; now, therefore,
26	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
28	Sec. 1. 3 MRSA §168-A is enacted to read:
30	§168-A. Legislative Youth Advisory Council
32	There is established the Legislative Youth Advisory Council,
34	referred to in this section as the "council."
36	1. Duties. The council shall perform the following duties:
38	A. Advise the Legislature, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives on proposed and
40	<pre>pending legislation, state budget expenditures and policy matters related to youth;</pre>
42	B. Advise the joint standing committees of the Legislature and study commissions, committees and task forces regarding
44	issues related to youth;
46	C. Conduct an annual seminar each August for its members regarding leadership, government and the Legislature, to
48	which Legislators must be invited;
50	D. Meet at least 6 times per year and conduct 2 public hearings per year on issues of importance to youth: and

2	E. Publish an annual report of its activities and present
	the report to the Legislature by February 15th of each
4	year. The council may submit legislation to the Legislature.
6	2. Jurisdiction. The council shall examine issues of
	importance to youth, including, but not limited to, education,
8	employment, strategies to increase youth participation in
	municipal government and State Government, safe environments for
10	youth, substance abuse, emotional and physical health, foster
10	care, poverty, homelessness and youth access to services on
12	municipal and statewide bases.
14	3. Membership. The council consists of 21 voting members
	and 5 nonvoting members who are Maine residents in accordance
16	with this subsection. In appointing members, the appointing
	authorities shall consider geographic distribution and shall
18	appoint at least one member from each of the 3 service regions of
	the Department of Human Services. Members shall serve for terms
20	of 2 years, except that the appointing authorities shall appoint
2.2	1/2 of the members first appointed to the council to terms of one
22	<u>year.</u>
24	A. The President of the Senate shall appoint 10 members as

(2) One youth who is enrolled in an equivalent instruction program under Title 20-A, chapter 211, 2 subchapter I-A; Two students at postsecondary educational institutions located within the State; and 6 (4) Two members of the House of Representatives whose 8 terms coincide with their terms of office in the House 10 of Representatives. 12 C. The members of the Children's Cabinet, established pursuant to Title 5, section 19131, serve ex officio and may 14 not vote. 16 4. Chairs. At the first meeting of each calendar year, the members shall elect one of their youth members to serve as cochair for a term of one year. The member of the House of 18 Representatives who is the first appointed by the Speaker shall 20 serve as cochair. 2.2 5. Cooperation with Department of Education. The council shall work cooperatively with the Department of Education regarding the granting of school credit for council service and 24 the integration of council experience into the learning results curriculum for leadership and government. 26 28 6. Priorities. The council shall set priorities and shall determine the function of subcommittees, standards of conduct, 30 process, procedures and the use of technology to convene meetings. Council members shall review and consider the 32 procedures and rules used by the Legislature as they may be appropriate for use as models for the council. 34 7. Communication. The council may provide testimony on 36 legislation pending before the Legislature. 8. Compensation. Members of the council who are 38 Legislators are entitled to the legislative per diem and to 40 reimbursement of reasonable expenses incurred in order to serve on the council as provided in Title 5, section 12004-I, 42 subsection 54-C. All other members who are not otherwise reimbursed for their service on the council are entitled to 44 compensation for reasonable expenses incurred in order to serve on the council as provided in Title 5, section 12004-I, 46 subsection 54-C.
