| 50       | This bill may increase prosecutions for Class C crimes. Sentences of more than 9 months imposed for Class C crimes must be served in state correctional institutions. The cost to the  |

State per sentence is \$73,330 based upon an average length of stay of 2 years and 4 months.

This bill may also increase prosecutions for Class D crimes. If a jail sentence is imposed, the additional costs to the counties are estimated to be \$83.36 per day per prisoner. The number of prosecutions that may result in a jail sentence and the resulting costs to the county jail system are expected to be insignificant.

The Judicial Department may require additional General Fund appropriations to cover indigent defense costs related to these new cases. The amounts can not be estimated at this time. The additional workload and administrative costs associated with the minimal number of new cases filed in the court system can be absorbed within the budgeted resources of the Judicial Department. The collection of additional fines may also increase General Fund revenue by minor amounts.'

## **SUMMARY**

This amendment replaces the bill. The amendment adds to the Maine Criminal Code the new crime of unlawful interference with horses used for law enforcement purposes. A person is guilty of the Class C crime of unlawful interference with a law enforcement horse if the person intentionally or knowingly kills, mutilates or permanently disables a horse that the person knows or reasonably should have known is used for law enforcement purposes. A person is guilty of the Class D crime of unlawful interference with a law enforcement horse if the person torments, beats, strikes, injures, temporarily disables or otherwise mistreats a horse that the person knows or reasonably should have known is used for law enforcement purposes. The amendment also adds a fiscal note to the bill.
