Resolve, to Continue the Study of the Benefits and Costs for Increasing Access to Family and Medical Leave for Maine Families.

(EMERGENCY)

Reported by Speaker SAXL for the Committee to Study the Benefits and Costs for Increasing Access to Family and Medical Leave for Maine Families pursuant to Joint Order 2001, H.P. 1386, section 8.

Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts and resolves of the 2 Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

Whereas, the Committee to Study the Benefits and Costs for Increasing Access to Family and Medical Leave for Maine Families was created by joint order in the First Regular Session of the 120th Legislature; and

10 Whereas, members of that committee found that they had insufficient information with which to make a recommendation 12 following their first period of work; and

14 Whereas, a thoughtful recommendation based on sufficient information on the issue of paid family and medical leave is 16 important to both employees and employers in the State; and

18 Whereas, members of the committee desire to continue their work in the interim following the adjournment of the Second 20 Regular Session of the 120th Legislature and to convene as quickly as possible to provide for continuity of the study; and

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Whereas, passage of this resolve will enable the committee 24 to submit legislation to the First Regular Session of the 121st Legislature; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore, be it

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Sec. 1. Committee established. Resolved: That the Committee to Continue to Study the Benefits and Costs for Increasing Access to Family and Medical Leave for Maine Families, referred to in this resolve as the "committee," is established; and be it further

38 Sec. 2. Committee membership. Resolved: That the committee consists of 15 members:

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Seven members appointed by the President of the Senate
 as follows:

- 44 A. One Senator;
- 46 B. One representative of employers in the health care industry;

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с. One representative of employers in the insurance 2 industry; One representative of municipal employers; and 4 D. 6 Ε. Three members representing labor, women's groups and senior citizens: 8 Six members appointed by the Speaker of the House of 2. 10 Representatives as follows: 12 Α. One member of the House of Representatives; 14 в. One representative from the low-income advocacy field; 16 c. One representative of a child care organization; 18 D. One parent or educator; and 20 Ε. Two members of the business community, one representing a large business and one representing a small business; 22 The President of the Maine State Chamber of Commerce or 3. the president's designee; and 24 The Commissioner of Labor or the commissioner's designee. 26 4 The Senator and the member of the House of Representatives 28 may not be members of the same political party; and be it further 30 Sec. 3. Chairs. Resolved: That the Senate member is the Senate chair of the committee and the House of Representatives 32 member is the House chair of the committee; and be it further 34 Sec. 4. Appointments; meetings. **Resolved:** That all appointments must be made no later than 30 days following the 36 effective date of this resolve. The appointing authorities shall notify the Executive Director of the Legislative Council once the 38 appointments have been made. When the appointment of all members has been completed, the chairs of the committee shall call and 40 convene the first meeting of the committee no later than July 1, 42 2002: and be it further Sec. 5. Duties. Resolved: That the committee shall study the 44 benefits and costs of providing family and medical leave benefits. In conducting the study, the committee shall: 46 1. Review and consider information gathered by 48 the committee during the 2001 interim; 50

Continue to examine the issues set forth in Joint Order
 2001, House Paper 1386, section 5, paragraph A;

- 3. Identify or develop additional sources of Maine-specific
 data on use of family and medical leave and the availability of
 paid leave;
- 8 4. Obtain information from other states and interest groups that are conducting studies or developing methodologies for 10 estimating costs and benefits on paid family and medical leave;
- 12 5. Arrange for the assistance of experts in economic analysis to prepare costs and benefit estimates for the 14 committee; and
- 16 6. Invite testimony from experts on early childhood development, including experts on bonding between children and
 18 parents, to assist the committee in considering potential long-term benefits of providing paid leave so that parents will
 20 be able to take leave following the birth or adoption of a child; and be it further
- Sec. 6. Staff assistance. Resolved: That, upon approval of the Legislative Council, the Office of Policy and Legal Analysis shall provide necessary staffing services to the committee; and be it further

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- Sec. 7. Compensation. Resolved: That members of the committee 28 who are Legislators are entitled to the legislative per diem, as defined in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 3, section 2, and 30 reimbursement for necessary expenses incurred for their attendance at authorized meetings of the committee. 32 Other members of the committee are entitled to receive reimbursement of necessary expenses incurred for their attendance at authorized 34 meetings of the committee only if sufficient outside funds are 36 received for this purpose in accordance with section 9; and be it further
- Sec. 8. Report. Resolved: That the committee shall submit its
 report, together with any necessary implementing legislation, to
 the First Regular Session of the 121st Legislature no later than
 December 1, 2002. If the committee requires a limited extension
 of time to conclude its work, it may apply to the Legislative
 Council, which may grant the extension; and be it further
- 46 Sec. 9. Budget; grants. Resolved: That the chairs of the committee, with assistance from the committee staff, shall
 48 administer the committee's budget. Within 10 days after the its first meeting, the committee shall present a work plan and
 50 proposed budget to

the Legislative Council for approval. The committee may not 2 incur expenses that would result in the committee's exceeding its approved budget. Upon request from the committee, the Executive Director of the Legislative Council promptly shall provide the 4 committee chairs and staff with a status report on the committee's budget, expenditures incurred and paid and available 6 The chairs of the committee may seek and accept grants funds. and other outside funding on behalf of the committee. 8 Prompt notice of solicitation and acceptance of such funds must be sent 10 to the Legislative Council. All funds accepted must be forwarded to the executive director, along with an accounting that includes amount, date received, from whom, purpose and limitation on use 12 of the funds. The executive director administers any funds 14 received.

16 **Emergency clause.** In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this resolve takes effect when approved.

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SUMMARY

22 This resolve is the recommendation of the Committee to Study the Benefits and Costs for Increasing Access to Family and Medical Leave for Maine Families, which was created by joint 24 order in the First Regular Session of the 120th Legislature. The committee recommended that it be allowed to continue its work 26 during another interim, since the lack of sufficient data prevented members from reaching a conclusion in 2001 regarding 28 the costs and benefits of paid family and medical leave in Maine. Several state and interest groups are working on creating 30 models for estimating costs and benefits of paid family and medical leave, which the committee may be able to use in 2002. 32 Also, committee members intend to identify interest groups and experts in Maine to gather data for the next phase of the study 34 and to provide economic analysis expertise necessary to use that 36 data.
