Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

Sec. 1. 7 MRSA 3907, sub-12-D, as amended by PL 2001, c. 399, 4, is further amended to read:

12-D. Dangerous dog. "Dangerous dog" means a dog that б bites an individual who is not trespassing on the dog owner's or 8 keeper's premises at the time of the bite or a dog that causes a reasonable and prudent person who is not on the dog owner's or keeper's premises and is acting in a reasonable and nonaggressive 10 imminent bodily injury by assaulting or manner to fear 12 threatening to assault that individual or individual's domestic animal. The term includes any definition adopted by a municipality pursuant to section 3954. "Dangerous dog" does not 14 include a dog certified by the State and used for law enforcement 16 use.

18 For the purposes of this definition, "dog owner's or keeper's premises" means the residence or residences, including buildings 20 and land and motor vehicles, belonging to the owner or keeper of the dog.
