Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

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PART A

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Sec. A-1. Authorization of bonds to provide for funds to construct and upgrade water pollution control facilities, to remove discharges, and to make renovations and enhance wastewater treatment at the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife's fish-rearing facilities. The Treasurer of State is authorized, under the direction of the Governor, to issue bonds in the name and on behalf of the State in an amount not exceeding \$13,500,000, as authorized in section 6 of this Part, to raise funds to construct and upgrade water pollution control facilities, to remove discharges and to make renovations and enhance wastewater treatment at the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife's fish-rearing facilities. The bonds are a pledge of the full faith and credit of the State. may not run for a period longer than 10 years from the date of the original issue of the bonds. At the discretion of the Treasurer of State, with the approval of the Governor, issuance of bonds may contain a call feature.

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Sec. A-2. Records of bonds issued to be kept by the Treasurer of State. The Treasurer of State shall keep an account of each bond showing the number of the bond, the name of the successful bidder to whom sold, the amount received for the bond, the date of sale and the date when payable.

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Sec. A-3. Sale; how negotiated; proceeds appropriated. The Treasurer of State may negotiate the sale of the bonds by direction of the Governor, but no bond may be loaned, pledged or hypothecated on behalf of the State. The proceeds of the sale of the bonds, which must be held by the Treasurer of State and paid by the Treasurer of State upon warrants drawn by the State Controller, are appropriated solely for the purposes set forth in this Part. Any unencumbered balances remaining at the completion of the project in section 6 of this Part lapse to the debt service account established for the retirement of these bonds.

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Sec. A-9. Bonds authorized but not issued. Any bonds authorized

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are not issued within 5 years of ratification of this Part, are deauthorized and may not be issued; except that the Legislature may, within 2 years after the expiration of that 5-year period, extend the period for issuing any remaining unissued bonds or bond anticipation notes for an additional amount of time not to exceed 5 years.

Sec. A-10. Referendum for ratification; submission at general election; form of question; effective date. This Part must be submitted to the legal voters of the State of Maine at the next primary election in the month of June following passage of this Part. The municipal officers of this State shall notify the inhabitants of their respective cities, towns and plantations to meet, in the manner prescribed by law for holding a primary election, to vote on the acceptance or rejection of this Part by voting on the following question:

"Do you favor a \$13,500,000 bond issue for the following purposes:

1. The sum of \$5,500,000 to construct and upgrade water pollution control facilities, providing the state match for \$12,500,000 in federal funds;

2. The sum of \$1,000,000 to protect public health, safety and the environment by providing funds to remove overboard discharges; and

3. The sum of \$7,000,000 to make renovations and enhance wastewater treatment at the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife's fish-rearing facilities?"

The legal voters of each city, town and plantation shall vote by ballot on this question and designate their choice by a cross or check mark placed within a corresponding square below the word "Yes" or "No." The ballots must be received, sorted, counted and declared in open ward, town and plantation meetings and returns made to the Secretary of State in the same manner as votes for members of the Legislature. The Governor shall review the returns and, if a majority of the legal votes are cast in favor of this Part, the Governor shall proclaim the result without delay, and this Part becomes effective 30 days after the date of the proclamation.

The Secretary of State shall prepare and furnish to each city, town and plantation all ballots, returns and copies of this Part necessary to carry out the purpose of this referendum.

Sec. B-2. Records of bonds issued to be kept by the Treasurer of State. The Treasurer of State shall keep an account of each bond showing the number of the bond, the name of the successful bidder to whom sold, the amount received for the bond, the date of sale and the date when payable.

Sec. B-3. Sale; how negotiated; proceeds appropriated. The Treasurer of State may negotiate the sale of the bonds by direction of the Governor, but no bond may be loaned, pledged or hypothecated on behalf of the State. The proceeds of the sale of the bonds, which must be held by the Treasurer of State and paid by the Treasurer of State upon warrants drawn by the State Controller, are appropriated solely for the purposes set forth in this Part. Any unencumbered balances remaining at the completion of the project in section 6 of this Part lapse to the debt service account established for the retirement of these bonds.

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Sec. B-4. Interest and debt retirement. The Treasurer of State shall pay interest due or accruing on any bonds issued under this Part and all sums coming due for payment of bonds at maturity.

Sec. B-5. Disbursement of bond proceeds. The proceeds of the bonds must be expended as set out in section 6 of this Part under the direction and supervision of the Department of Environmental Protection, the Department of Human Services, the Department of Administrative and Financial Services, the State Planning Office within the Executive Department and the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources.

Sec. B-6. Allocations from General Fund bond issue; to provide grants to municipalities through the Small Communities Grants Program, to clean up uncontrolled hazardous substance sites, to remediate solid waste landfills, to make drinking water system improvements, to develop public recycling and household hazardous waste management infrastructure, to promote standardization and use of public geographic data, to construct new or retrofit existing pollution control structures on Maine farms to protect the environment, to construct environmentally sound water sources that help avoid drought damage to crops and to recapitalize the Potato Marketing Improvement Fund. Further amend the bill by inserting at the end before the summary the following:

'FISCAL NOTE

This bill includes 2 referenda, one to be submitted to the voters in June 2002 and one to be submitted to the voters in November. The estimated cost of sending each of these referenda requesting approval of a General Fund bond issue will vary according to the total number of referenda enacted during the Second Regular Session of the 120th Legislature to be submitted to the voters in June and November. The estimated cost to the Secretary of State if one to 6 referenda are enacted is \$121,392 for each of the elections. Each additional referendum above the 6 question threshold costs an additional \$8,000. The length of the questions for these bond issues will reduce the number of questions at each election before the threshold is reached.

If approved by the voters, the total costs of these bond issues are estimated to be \$30,973,150 with principal payments of \$24,300,000 and interest payments of approximately \$6,673,150.

The State Planning Office within the Executive Department, the Department of Administrative and Financial Services, the Department of Environmental Protection, the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife, the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources and the Department of Human Services will incur
