An Act to Authorize a General Fund Bond Issue in the Amount of \$19,300,000 to Construct and Upgrade Water Pollution Control Facilities, to Remove Discharges, to Clean up Tire Stockpiles, to Clean up Uncontrolled Hazardous Substance Sites, to Remediate Solid Waste Landfills, to Make Drinking Water System Improvements, to Address Household Hazardous Wastes and to Promote Standardization and Use of Public Geographic Data.

Preamble. Two thirds of both Houses of the Legislature deeming it necessary in accordance with the Constitution of Maine, Article IX, Section 14 to authorize the issuance of bonds on behalf of the State of Maine to provide funds to construct and upgrade water pollution control facilities, to remove discharges, to clean up tire stockpiles, to clean up uncontrolled hazardous substance sites, to remediate solid waste landfills, to make drinking water system improvements, to address household hazardous wastes and to promote standardization and use of public geographic data.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

Sec. 1. Authorization of bonds to provide for funds to construct and upgrade water pollution control facilities, to remove discharges, to clean up tire stockpiles, to clean up uncontrolled hazardous substance sites, to remediate solid waste landfills, to make drinking water system improvements, to address household hazardous wastes and to promote standardization and use of public geographic data. The Treasurer of State is authorized, under the direction of the Governor, to issue bonds in the name and on behalf of the State in an amount not exceeding \$19,300,000, as authorized in Section 6, to raise construct and upgrade water pollution facilities, to remove discharges, to clean up tire stockpiles, to clean up uncontrolled hazardous substance sites, to remediate landfills, waste to make drinking water system improvements, to address household hazardous wastes and to promote standardization and use of public geographic data. bonds are a pledge of the full faith and credit of the State. The bonds may not run for a period longer than 10 years from the date of the original issue of the bonds. At the discretion of the Treasurer of State, with the approval of the Governor, any issuance of bonds may contain a call feature.

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Sec. 2. Records of bonds issued to be kept by the Treasurer of State. The Treasurer of State shall keep an account of each bond showing the number of the bond, the name of the successful bidder to whom sold, the amount received for the bond, the date of sale and the date when payable.

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Sec. 3. Sale; how negotiated; proceeds appropriated. The Treasurer of State may negotiate the sale of the bonds by direction of the Governor, but no bond may be loaned, pledged or hypothecated on behalf of the State. The proceeds of the sale of the bonds, which must be held by the Treasurer of State and paid by the Treasurer of State upon warrants drawn by the State Controller, are appropriated solely for the purposes set forth in this Act. Any unencumbered balances remaining at the completion

of the project in section 6 lapse to the debt service account established for the retirement of these bonds.

- Sec. 4. Interest and debt retirement. The Treasurer of State shall pay interest due or accruing on any bonds issued under this Act and all sums coming due for payment of bonds at maturity.
- 8 Sec. 5. Disbursement of bond proceeds. The proceeds of the bonds must be expended as set out in section 6 under the direction and supervision of the Department of Environmental Protection, the Department of Human Services, the Department of Administrative and Financial Services and the State Planning Office.

Sec. 6. Allocations from General Fund bond issue; to construct and upgrade water pollution control facilities, to remove discharges, to clean up tire stockpiles, to clean up uncontrolled hazardous substance sites, to remediate solid waste landfills, to make drinking water system improvements, to address household hazardous wastes and to promote the standardization and use of public geographic information. The proceeds of the sale of the bonds must be expended as designated in the following schedule.

Sec. 7. Contingent upon ratification of bond issue. Sections 1 to 6 do not become effective unless the people of the State have ratified the issuance of the bonds as set forth in this Act.

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Sec. 8. Appropriation balances at year-end. At the end of each fiscal year, all unencumbered appropriation balances representing state money carry forward. Bond proceeds that have not been expended within 10 years after the date of the sale of the bonds lapse to General Fund debt service.

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- Sec. 9. Bonds authorized but not issued. Any bonds authorized but not issued, or for which bond anticipation notes are not issued within 5 years of ratification of this Act, are deauthorized and may not be issued; except that the Legislature may, within 2 years after the expiration of that 5-year period, extend the period for issuing any remaining unissued bonds or bond anticipation notes for an additional amount of time not to exceed 5 years.
- Sec. 10. Referendum for ratification; submission at general election; form of question; effective date. This Act must be submitted to the legal voters of the State of Maine at the next general election in the month of November following passage of this Act. The municipal officers of this State shall notify the inhabitants of their respective cities, towns and plantations to meet, in the manner prescribed by law for holding a general

election, to vote on the acceptance or rejection of this Act by 2 voting on the following question: "Do you favor a \$19,300,000 bond issue for the following 4 purposes: 6 The sum of \$8,000,000 to construct and upgrade water (1) 8 pollution control facilities, providing the state match for \$12,500,000 in federal funds; 10 The sum of \$1,000,000 to protect public health, safety and the environment by providing funds to remove and replace 12 overboard discharges; 14 The sum of \$1,000,000 to protect public health, safety 16 and the environment by providing funds to remove and replace failing septic systems; 18 The sum of \$500,000 to protect public health, safety and the environment by providing funds for the clean up of 20 tire stockpiles; 22 (5) The sum of \$1,000,000 to clean up uncontrolled 24 hazardous substance sites; 26 The sum of \$500,000 to remediate solid waste landfills; (6) (7) The sum of \$1,800,000 to support drinking water system 28 improvements that address public health threats, providing the State match for \$6,000,000 in federal funds; 30 32 The sum of \$4,000,000 to acquire the technology and services required to establish an Internet-based Maine public library of geographic information, improve citizens' 34 access to public geographic information, make grants to municipalities for voluntary automation of parcel and zoning 36 maps to uniform standards, provide the State match for at 38 least \$1,600,000 in federal funds and participate intergovernmental data development agreements; and 40 The sum of \$1,500,000 to support household hazardous 42 waste collection?" 44 The legal voters of each city, town and plantation shall vote by ballot on this question and designate their choice by a cross or check mark placed within a corresponding square below 46 the word "Yes" or "No." The ballots must be received, sorted, 48 counted and declared in open ward, town and plantation meetings

and returns made to the Secretary of State in the same manner as votes for members of the Legislature. The Governor shall review

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the returns and, if a majority of the legal votes are cast in favor of this Act, the Governor shall proclaim the result without 2 delay, and this Act becomes effective 30 days after the date of the proclamation.
